SANTA FE TO PAY BENEFITS AT DEATH ON WAGE BASIS

Plan Inaugurated Tomorrow as Test—May Be Permanent

CHICAGO, June 30.—The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway system has decided on a plan of death benefits for the beneficiaries of all employees in the service two or more years, it was announced today by E. P. Ripley, president.

Beginning July 1 the company will pay to the beneficiary of every employee dying in its service a sum equal to 5 per cent. of his last 12 months' salary, multiplied by the number of years of continuous service, with a minimum payment of \$250 and a maximum payment of one year's salary, but not exceeding \$500.

Mr. Ripley said, "but the present year has been a year of unusual prosperity, and feeling that the results attained are, in part, due to the efforts of our employees, it is desired to recognize these efforts in a substantial way."

MEAT ANIMAL PRODUCERS RECEIVE HIGHER PRICES

Increase of 16.7 Per Cent. to Consumer in Year

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Prices paid producers of meat animals—hogs, cattle, sheep and chickens—increased 6.2 per cent. from May 15 to June 15, and were 16.7 per cent. higher on June 15 than they were a year ago and 12.2 per cent. higher than the average of the last six years on that date.

A Department of Agriculture announcement shows prices of hogs June 15 averaged \$12.12 a hundred pounds, an increase of \$1.41 from a year ago and \$1.11 higher than the six-year average.

PLATTSBURG ROOKIES MARCH UPON CANADA

Citizen Soldiers Have Hard Day With Enemy, but He Retreats

CHAMPLAIN, N. Y., June 30.—The rookie regiment, encamped near here today after an all-day running fight with its theoretical enemy, has decided that the preparedness situation has become serious enough to demand special action on its part. Therefore, the rookies voted as a regiment to join the Military Training Camps Association and to work with that organization for universal military training under Federal control.

Theodore Rousseau, secretary to Mayor Mitchell, was chosen chairman, and a committee of five sergeants was voted to carry out the plan.

Shortly after breaking camp in the morning at 6 o'clock they came in contact with their enemy, and in forcing the fight pushed by him and went tumbling clear out of their own peaceful country and over into war-bound Canada.

In the lead of the column that got out of bounds was Lieutenant Rhinelander Waldo, former Police Commissioner of New York, astride a prancing charger. He would apparently have kept on going to Montreal if the umpires had not seen what had happened and peremptorily ordered the men back to their own country.

PARALYSIS PLAGUE SPREADS

275 Cases Now Reported in Brooklyn and New York

NEW YORK, June 30.—Forty-nine new cases of infantile paralysis—the greatest number in one day since the epidemic began—have been reported by the Health Department. This makes the total 275.

All but four of the new cases are in Brooklyn, where the infected area is enlarging; the disease having jumped at far as ten blocks at a time. The Sheepshead Bay section has been included for the first time, two cases being reported there.

On Staten Island three cases were reported last night, in West New Brighton, Marine's Harbor and Totterville. No additional cases were reported in Manhattan, but the Bronx's first case was found on Fox street.

Several deaths—the exact number was not obtainable—have occurred from the disease this week, at least one yesterday.

PANCHO VILLA IS ALIVE AGAIN

Mexican Bandit Leader This Time Is in Durango State

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., June 30.—Francisco "Pancho" Villa is still alive, according to information that has just reached an American living in this city, who has spent a large part of his life in Mexico and has known the bandit chief personally. The information came from native sources in Mexico, and its recipient is convinced that it came from sources that are absolutely reliable.

According to the story coming to this American—he has large financial interests still at stake in Mexico, and is anxious that his name be withheld from publication, at least for the present—Villa was really wounded early in Pershing's campaign, as was reported, but was not shot in the knee and has fully recovered, and is in Durango.

NEGRO HANGED FOR MURDER

Man Convicted for Killing Woman Pays Death Penalty at Hagerstown, Md.

HAGERSTOWN, Md., June 30.—John Brown, a negro, was hanged today for the murder of Mrs. Susan Dixon. He shot the woman through a window while she was in bed, presumably with a robbery motive. This was the first hanging here in 17 years.

OUTFIT FOR T. R. ARMY FORTHCOMING IN JIFFY

Everything in Way of Equipment Offered Roosevelt for Mexico Dash

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., June 30.—The news that Colonel Roosevelt was raising a volunteer division to serve in the event of a Mexican campaign has caused such a rush of telegrams to Sagamore Hill that the operator in Oyster Bay has been forced to call in aid, and messenger boys are arriving every few hours from Glen Cove, carrying the applications to enlist in the T. R. Brigade.

Today his secretary, Walter J. Hayes, issued the following statement regarding the question of replying to the messages which Colonel Roosevelt has received in the matter of his division:

"We have been literally deluged with telegrams and letters of application from men who wish to join a volunteer division. It is impossible to reply individually to the organizations and to the men who have communicated with us. But I will see that their applications are carefully filed for future reference, so that in the event of hostilities they can be apprised of what action is contemplated."

Not only are applications for personal service coming in by the thousands, but also offers of equipment. It is learned that had been totally unexpected. Everything which could be possibly needed by such a division in the field, from a high-powered armored aeroplane to material for a field telephone, could be supplied from private sources if the Colonel required it.

Colonel Roosevelt himself, who is looking more fit every day, declined positively to comment in any way on any plans regarding the division.

LAFE YOUNG FOR PRESIDENT IN 1917

Vigorous Iowa Newspaper Man Boomed to Succeed Houston Next Year

Lafe Young, publisher of the Des Moines Capital and vice president of the A. A. C. of W., is being groomed by his friends all over the country and by the Des Moines advertising men to succeed Mr. Herbert S. Houston as president of the club at St. Louis in 1917.


