SUGAR COATING FOR A BITTER PILL
A Plea for Court Reform in a Humorous Book by a New York Judge on the Way Justice Is Not Done

The homely adage that there are more ways of killing a cat than by choking it with butter has a wide application. Sober thinkers had the same thought in mind when he made one of his characters determine by induction to find direction out. Frederic De Witt Wells, a Justice in the Municipal Court of New York, must have been thinking of these classical sayings when he sat him down to write "The Man in Court."

Justice Wells treats the jury system as he treats the other judicial institutions. That is, he exhibits it at work. He concludes his comments on it in this way, putting more into a few words than any legal commentators have done:
Law is an exact, definite statement of principles, absolute and apparently immutable. When a man on the street walks up to another and wantonly insults him, the law is that the party insulted must turn and walk away.

Susan Lennox's Career

In this novel, posthumously published, of two volumes, respectively 500 and 550 pages each, Mr. Phillips writes in "Thackerayan quality" an account of the life of Susan Lennox, a girl who, through the influence of her father, Robert W.
