McNICHOL THREAT Senator's Mailed Fist Descends When Vane Steam Roller Works REFERS TO 1905 RUPTURE

State Senator James P. McNichol this afternoon buried at the Vane brothers a threat that if they fight him too hard a Republican campaign will be destructive as that of 1905 will result.

After a long hearing of principals and witnesses in both contests, the committee voted to name John E. Vane members to settle the dispute.
