JULY PLANTING POSSIBLE FOR NUMEROUS VEGETABLES

Seeds or Plants Put in Now Will Give "Eats" for August and Fall and Furnish Crops for Winter Storing, Drying, Canning and Pickling

It is not too late to plant: Wax beans, Muskmelons, Watermelons, Okra, Tomatoes, Eggplant, Cabbage, Carrots, Cucumbers...

LET me suggest that every one who creates or cultivates a garden helps, and helps greatly, to solve the problem of the feeding of the nations.—President Wilson.

There is time yet to start a home garden. Spade the ground and start this week. Beans (both lima and string), onions, corn, beets, tomato plants, carrots, cucumbers, cabbage plants can be put in.

Tomatoes—Set the plants (purchased or grown early in hotbeds) eighteen inches apart in rows two and a half to three feet apart.

Eggplant—Set the plants eighteen to twenty-four inches apart in rows two and a half to three feet apart.

Peppers—Set the plants fifteen to eighteen inches apart in rows one and a half to two feet apart.

Beets—Sow in rows fifteen to eighteen inches apart for hand cultivation or two to two and a half feet apart for horse cultivation.

Carrots—Sow in drills two feet apart, one-half inch deep.

Watermelons—Sow in beds well enriched with manure. An acre of seed will make 2000 plants.

Cucumbers—Plant eight to ten seeds in a hill spacing the hills five feet apart.

Muskmelons—The culture of the muskmelon is the same as the cucumber except that the plants are given more space.

Okra—The rows should be three to four feet apart for the dwarf varieties and four to five feet apart for the tall kinds.

Watermelons—The culture of the watermelon is the same as the muskmelon, except that the plants require more space.
