

KERENSKY CAPTURED, REPORT IN STOCKHOLM

NEW REGIME STRENGTHENS GRIP UPON RUSSIAN CAPITAL; JOINED BY NORTHERN ARMY

Deposed Ministers to Be Tried for Conspiracy—Petrograd Reported Almost Normal After Successful Coup d'Etat of Lenine and Trotsky

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 9. Arrest of Premier Kerensky of Russia is reported in messages received here today. No details were given of how the Bolsheviks succeeded in apprehending the head of the provisional Government.

Petrograd is almost normal today, with the new revolutionary Government in full control and maintaining virtually complete order.

The All-Russian Council announced today that Kerensky's last appearance was at Katchina, near Petrograd, on Wednesday, when the former Premier addressed 6000 soldiers and persuaded them not to march on Petrograd.

President Trotsky, of the Petrograd Soviet, said the new regime proposed to try all members of the Kerensky Government on the charge that they were conspirators in the Korniloff revolt.

The Bolshevik military committee decided to imprison Korniloff and others not in sympathy with its program.

The Women's Battalion of Death, charged by the old Government with defense of the Winter Palace, held out to the last and surrendered when literally overwhelmed by the Bolshevik troops and menaced by enough guns to blow the whole place up.

Nicholas Lenine's reappearance was greeted with cheers by the Bolsheviks and other Bolshevik leaders, who have been in hiding for more than a month, showed up minus his customary mustache, but otherwise recognizable.

RUSSIA AGAIN IN CHAOS; FANATICS TAKE CONTROL; LONDON IS PESSIMISTIC

LONDON, Nov. 9. Russia is back again where she was last March. Bolshevik fanatics, extreme radicals who burn to at once make the world a brotherhood, who are set against all who do not believe in uttermost democracy, today seemed to control all of Petrograd, the capital.

The situation was regarded here as precisely parallel to the first days following the revolution by which the Czar was ousted. Then it was Lenin, Trotsky and other fanatics who first seized the outward symbols of government in Petrograd, while the Bolsheviks actually held the support of the remainder of Russia.

The danger, as London saw it today, was that Lenin, Trotsky and their fellow fanatics of the Bolshevik would be able to extend their control beyond Petrograd and sway Russia's great Lebensraum population, ignorant of the Utopian idealism of the Bolsheviks to their side.

Kerensky apparently has escaped the rebels in Petrograd by the sea, and is en route to Moscow. It was believed here that he would name that city the capital and there endeavor to consolidate all Russia behind the existing group at Petrograd.

Nicholas Lenine, radical fanatics, whose energies have always been regarded here as directed from Berlin, is firmly seated in power at Petrograd by the new revolution.

GERMAN HAND SEEN. In London it was regarded as virtually certain that Trotsky and Lenine engineered their coup with Germany's direct aid.

CADORNA OUT; ALLIED CHIEFS TO LEAD ARMY

Italian Embassy at Washington Hears Commander Is Deposed

DALL'OLIO SUCCESSOR

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9. General Cadorna has been relieved of the high command of the Italian armies and the defense of Italy from the advancing Teutons has been vested in a board of Allied generals, in the belief of the Italian Embassy here this afternoon.

Dispatches also stated that the future command of the army will be invested in three generals, with General Dall'olio as the ranking officer.

According to the embassy's belief, the change was directed by the conference of allied ministers and generals at Rapallo, Italy, attended by the Premiers of England, Italy and France, and their leading field marshals.

The new board of strategy possibly will include Cadorna. The board is believed to have chosen the new defense line on which it is hoped to turn back the invaders and save Italy perhaps from collapse as a war factor.

The Italian rearguard has effectively and valiantly delayed the Teuton advance, and the positions behind the upper Brenta, according to Rome cables today.

ROME, Nov. 9. General Cadorna's army today occupies the most naturally and best fortified ground since the beginning of its retreat through the Friuli plains.

To the left and north, one wing of the Italian army is hastening to take up excellent positions behind the upper Brenta. This line, military critics say, will connect with the center and right wings of the Italian forces to be massed along the Piave.

FRANCE-BRITISH troops are now on the front and Premier Lloyd George and other British officials are also there inspecting the Allied re-enforcements.

Behind the Italian battle formation lies the Piave river, which is believed to be the last line of defense.

LEAPS TO DEATH AT HOSPITAL

DEUTSCH MAKES 'LAST-DITCH' MOVE

Seeks to Keep Fifth Ward Case From Going to Grand Jury

BLOCKED FOR PRESENT

Another effort of the attorneys for Isaac Deutsch, Lieutenant Bennett and the five policemen in the Fifth Ward tragedy to keep their cases from going to the Grand Jury was made late today.

William T. Connor, of Congressman John R. K. Scott's office, who represents the defendants, appeared before Sol Malberger, Clerk of the Miscellaneous Criminal Court, to file exceptions to the return of the cases to the November Grand Jury.

The arrival of the Allied forces strengthens the belief that the crucial battle is to be fought along the Piave River, where, along the west bank, combined formation with new arrivals is possible through the delayed arrival of the enemy.

GERMANTOWN HIGH DEFEATS CENTRAL

Weak Manheim Eleven Surprises by Downing Mirrors in Gimbel Cup Game

FINAL SCORE WAS 14 TO 0

Central High defeated Germantown High 14 to 0 in a football game today. The game was played at the Gimbel Cup stadium. Central High scored all their points in the first half.

HOUSTON FIELD, Nov. 9. Germantown High registered its first victory of the season in the Intercollegiate League here this afternoon when the supposedly weak Manheim youngsters took the Central High boys in a Gimbel Cup match. The final score was 14 to 0.

This was one of the big surprises of the season. Booted and kicked around in the first two league games and considered the "goats" of the league, the Germantown High boys put so much power and punch into their drive this afternoon that the strong Central High boys were unable to stop the offense.

Ten Thousand Boys Agree to Earn \$10 Each for Course

EXTRA WORK PLANNED

President Indorses Work of the Y. M. C. A. President Wilson in a letter addressed to John R. Mott, general secretary of the National War Work Council of the Y. M. C. A., has indorsed the association's work as follows:

"I wish to express to you the very high value I have attached to the work which has been accomplished by the Young Men's Christian Association in behalf of our own army and navy, as well as in behalf of the prisoners of war and the men in the training camps in Europe.

"I also wish to express my sincere personal interest in the large plans of the War Work Council for the war work which is still ahead of the association."

Young Philadelphia has enlisted for the \$25,000,000 national drive of the war work council of the Young Men's Christian Association scheduled to start next Monday. The city's quota is \$1,200,000.

Ten thousand Philadelphia boys have agreed to earn \$10 each for the fund, according to announcement made today. The call was issued to only 5000. Double that number have volunteered.

Ten thousand Pittsburgh boys also have enlisted in the \$10-campaign. All of the 200 Western Union messenger boys in that city have agreed to turn over \$10 each of their savings.

EARN WHAT THEY GIVE. The boys' campaign promises to be more spectacular than that of the "grown-ups." The latter can give money themselves. The members of the young army of enthusiasts will work to earn what they give.

It was explained at the headquarters of the campaign committee, at the Ritz-Carlton, that boys are not permitted to enlist for the drive without consent of parent or guardian. Furthermore, provision is made for paying the pledge of \$10 or multiples of \$10 in installments.

Y-O-U-M-C-A-CONTRIBUTE A-LSO! A dinner of the executive committee to the team captains and final instructions will be given at the Ritz-Carlton tomorrow night. The teams will meet for luncheon tomorrow.

SPECIAL EXPORT LICENSE FOR WAR COMMODITIES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—The War Trade Board announces that special licenses will hereafter be required for the export to all countries of high speed steel wire rope, arsenic and its compounds and carbon electrodes.

HAMBURG SHIP LINE OFFICE SEIZED BY U. S.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Acting on orders from Washington, United States Marshal McCarthy, with fifty city detectives and twenty deputy marshals, invaded the offices of the Hamburg-American Line, 45 Broadway, and took over the property of the company in the name of the Government.

BRAZIL CLOSING RIO DE JANEIRO PORT

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 9.—The Government has issued a decree ordering the closing of the port of Rio de Janeiro.

CHICAGO MAXIMUM RETAIL COAL RATES FIXED

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—Maximum retail prices, those the consumer will have to pay for anthracite and bituminous coal, have been fixed for Chicago and Cook County by John E. Williams, Illinois Fuel Administrator.

ILLEGAL MARKS PUT ON BALLOT, WITNESS SAYS

Additional Crosses Made After Count Started, Overseer Testifies

FIRST CASE CAN'T BE MADE BIG TEST

Unexpected Evidence Takes Matter Out of Election Court's Jurisdiction

NEW HEARING TOMORROW

Town Meeting Party's Chief Contention Now Hinges on Fourth Ward Charges

The five ballots which were thrown out of the count in the sixth division of the First Ward by the Republican Election Board will not figure in the test which the Town Meeting party is making to show wholesale election irregularities.

The ballots in question, which the Town Meeting party alleged were thrown out illegally by the election board because they were marked with crosses for the straight Town Meeting ticket and also for District Attorney Rotan, Organization candidate unopposed by the independents, were vitiated for another reason, it was testified.

Abraham August, an overseer of election in that division, told Judges Finletter and Martin that he saw the five ballots marked for the Town Meeting nominee and Mr. Rotan before the count started, and later, after the count, he saw them marked also for magisterial and school visitor candidates. Because they were thus improperly marked after the count began they were vitiated by the election officials, he said.

OUT OF JURISDICTION. The court, which had been expected to pass on the legality of a voter naming the Town Meeting candidates and Mr. Rotan, thereupon declared the contest out of its jurisdiction and ruled that the ballot-box should not be opened.

It was intimated that criminal proceedings to determine how the ballots were improperly marked would be started by the independents.

The last whereby the Town Meeting party hopes to establish that about 20,000 Town Meeting votes were thrown away illegally will come up tomorrow in the case of the third division of the Fourth Ward. Here, according to Harry J. Scott, Town Meeting candidate, twenty-five ballots were ready to be vitiated because of the double vote for Rotan and the Town Meeting nominee.

At the very outset of the investigation into the alleged fraudulent methods of the Organization election boards the "fare forces" spared for delay today by urging that the inquiry be switched to another court.

The election court presided over by Judges Finletter and Martin was ready to proceed with the case in the sixth division of the First Ward, when counsel for the Republican party asked that the case be tried before a contest court of Quarter Sessions.

This action was regarded by independents present as a confession of weakness on the part of the "fare forces" and decided in consistent with the previous statements in which they declared they would aid in such investigation.

It was argued by the Organization array of counsel, of which John R. K. Scott was chief spokesman, that Judges Finletter and Martin act only to compute the returns and that they had no power to decide on any alleged fraud.

ADMITS BALLOTS LEGAL. In the course of a long argument, Mr. Scott let slip the opinion that the ballots in question were legal ballots. Judge Finletter expressed the personal opinion that a palpable mistake had been made. He also said in reply to Mr. Scott that the court's function was to compute returns, but not to compute fraudulent returns.

William T. Connor, of the Organization counsel, cited numerous opinions to show that the election court could not pass on rejected ballots and that the Court of Quarter Sessions only had such power. Harry J. Scott, representing the Town Meeting party, called attention to the fact that laws from which Mr. Connor quoted were made prior to the act of May 6, 1908, which is the latest ballot law. Since there was a decision, he said, in which the Court refused to express any opinion as to the meaning of the law, Mr. Scott argued that the act of 1908 gives the election court full power to take any steps necessary to enlighten itself as to what the vote actually was, and does not have to accept returns made by election officials.

Judges Martin and Finletter ruled that election contests could be heard in the Election Court. Twenty-three ballots similarly were thrown out in the third division of the Fourth Ward, according to charges by Town Meeting leaders, who said that more than enough votes were thus vitiated throughout the city to assure the election of the independent nominees for the "fare" offices. Many of the 46,000 votes that were not recorded in the returns, they said, are accounted for by the throwing out of votes that the Supreme Court has passed on as legal.
