Cereals as shown by Bunge years ago and by Sherman, of Columbia, more recently, contain an excess of acids.

Meat contains four times as great an excess as wheat, which contains more acid than common rice.

The scarcity of beef and wheat should not be looked upon as a calamity, but a blessing.

Less meat and less wheat will help to clear the acid out of the tissues of our gouty and rheumatic tissues and to raise general vital resistance to disease.
