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

Seventy-one Names Given by Army and Thirty-three by Marines

25 KILLED IN ACTION Total of Severely Wounded Is Sixty-three, and Only Eight Other Dead

Washington, July 13. The army casualty list issued today contained seventy-one names. There were thirty-three names on the marine list.

The army list was divided as follows: Killed in action, fourteen; died of wounds, one; died of accident and other causes, two; wounded severely, forty-two; missing, eight.

The marine list was divided as follows: Killed in action, eleven; died of wounds, five; wounded severely, seventeen; missing, eight.

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Transport a Problem for "Chus" Animals

Circus Cars Unavailable and Question of Carrying Beasts is Grave

The problem of transporting newly twenty animals necessary for the proper presentation of the big musical extravaganza, "Chu Chin Chow," is worrying the producing managers, William Elliott, F. Ray Comstock and Marie Godt.

The attraction opens in Philadelphia at the new Shubert Theatre, the last week of August. Three camels, eight donkeys, two mares jacks from Thiber, four bullocks and a lot of other queer animals make up the menagerie which is an essential part of the entertainment.

Of course there are 200 actors to be considered also, but human beings, especially actors, can walk to new destinations if necessary. Animals have to be transported.

Up to the present time, no decision has been rendered by the railway administration on the subject of handling stage animals as baggage. The requirements of the "Chu Chin Chow" already call for five baggage cars, and it is estimated that two circus cars will have to be added to carry the animals.

But there are no circus cars available. The only ones owned by different circuses are now in transit.
