

CHAMPION WHITE SOX HERE FOR SERIES WITH ATHLETICS AT SHIBE PARK—OTHER SPORTS NEWS

LARGE CROWD EXPECTED TO ATTEND STAR FIGHTS AT SHIBE PARK TONIGHT

Tendler-Cline, Callahan-Chaney and Bartfield-Greb to Supply Action at Show GATES TO OPEN AT 6

By JAMES S. CAROLAN The largest crowd of the season is expected to be in Shibe Park tonight when the all-star boxing program is staged.

Yesterday was not a strenuous day for the gladiators. Over in River St. J. Lew Tendler, brilliant southpaw light weight, enjoyed himself to the limit at his palatial training quarters on the estate of Clarence Taubel.

Down in the "Neck" Frankie Callahan and Soldier Bartfield carefully worked under Reddy Wigmore's gaze. Reddy wants his boys to make a real showing, for he insists that he has the best conditioning place in the city.

Harry Greb and Irish Patsy Cline worked out in New York. Greb boxed with the sailors' headquarters, while Cline used Billy Grupp's well-known gymnasium. Jack Britton spent the afternoon with Cline.

George Chaney refused to do any heavy work. He confined his efforts to improving his left upon which he depends to flatten Callahan. Cline reached the city early last night and headed for the "Neck."

The main bout will bring together two flashy boys. Tendler and Cline unquestionably are the cleverest men on the program and both also carry a good punch.

Science as well as hard hitting will play a big role in deciding the winner. Cline must make 135 pounds ring-side, the same poundage he was forced to make when he battled Tendler in the special show last April.

"I have nothing to fear," said Tendler. "Any time I meet the same fellow the second time I know I can beat him worse than I did in the first fight. I beat Cline last spring and expect to win by a wider margin this time."

"I feel ready for the scrap of my life. This fight also means much to me, for if I beat Cline a good facing it will place me in line for a crack at the lightweight title."

Greb and Bartfield go on in the first of the three all-star engagements. Both are rugged fellows who should supply enough of the kind of action that the fans like. Greb was the busiest boxer during the 1917 season, engaging in thirty-seven battles.

The Chaney-Callahan engagement should prove to be an interesting one. In their six-round session at the Olympia a few months ago they staged a hurricane battle, in which body punches did much destructive work.

With accommodations for 17,000 at the apacious park the promoters do not intend to have any congestion at the gates and have arranged to have twelve thorough open early at 5:30 o'clock.

The right and left field covered stands will be used. There will be the 11 seats and there is room for 800. Due to the location of the ring and the excellent lighting facilities the ring will be seen easily from all parts of the stands.

"I look for a record crowd," said Promoter Leon Rains last night. "The advance sale has been a heavy one, in fact, much bigger than I ever expected. The interest in the fights is big, and with good weather I look for some gathering. It's a great show and the fans are aware of it."

Frank ("Pop") O'Brien will be the referee. He has officiated at many of the big bouts in this city and has delivered. His work is well known to the followers of boxing.
