

THREE U. S. CASUALTY REPORTS TOTAL 626

Eighty Pershing Men and Nineteen Marines Killed in Action—Other Deaths Total 63—Missing Total 105 and Wounded, All Degrees, 357

Washington, Oct. 10. The War Department announced 626 additional United States casualties on army and marine corps lists given out today and an army list last night. Today's army list of 301 names included: Killed in action, 83; missing in action, 115; wounded severely, 172; died of disease, 21; died of accident and other causes, 26; died from wounds, four; died from airplane accident, three; wounded, degree undetermined, four.
