Third Commanding Position in Argonne Region Is Captured

GREAT AREA EXPOSED Exploitation of Strong German Positions Without Organized Attack Made Possible

By the Associated Press With the American Army Northwest of Verdun, Oct. 15. In complete control of the Cote Chatillon, the Americans now hold the key to the great stretches to the north and northeast.

The hill is, in fact, the final of three keys, all of which have been bitterly defended. The first was Mamelotte, outside of Romagne, which, when won, gave access to the equally vital Dame Marie, and that position in turn gave access to Chatillon.

From the latter position the great masses of German defensive positions to the northwest can also be controlled and the line can be exploited further without organized attack because each position is on a sloping line.
