

JURIST DROPS WAR ON ROBINSON

Interchurch Federation Calls It Useless to Oppose Return

IN OLD JOB TOMORROW

Former Police Head Will Take Charge—Ministers to Watch Him

The Interchurch Federation has dropped its fight against James B. Robinson as superintendent of police.

Captain Robinson will return to active duty on his old job tomorrow.

The superintendent was expected to resume today, but postponed his "comeback" because of the holidays.

"It's useless," was the comment of the Rev. Dr. Edwin Hoyt Delt, chairman of the wartime committee of the federation, when asked if further protest would be made to Director Wilson against the return of Superintendent Robinson to active duty.

In the meantime, a close watch will be kept on the police department and any attempt to remove Captain Mills from control of the vice situation will be opposed.

A vigilance campaign against bootlegging and vice affecting men in uniform will be waged. If necessary, the federation will call on Secretary Daniels to make good his threat "to station mines and bluejackets at every street corner and to reformed men."

The Federation has just completed a report on conditions in South Philadelphia.

This report will not be made public present, but will be used in the general clean-up campaign.

According to Dr. Delt, the report "denies not less, but great vigilance and radical treatment in order to make at section of the city safe and restorable."

With Full Powers

Director Wilson, of the Department of Public Safety, declared Robinson will return to his old job tomorrow.

Ministers expressed today their disappointment over Robinson's "comeback" and their regret that the return of Captain Robinson to the position of Superintendent of Police, said Doctor Delt.

"Our dependence upon the correction of vice conditions in Philadelphia has been upon Captain Mills."

The Rev. William V. Berg, secretary of the Interchurch Federation, expressed his regret at Captain Robinson's return.

"Robinson's record speaks for itself," said Mr. Berg, who is pastor of the Central Congregational Church.

"On the basis of his record, he is a discredit to officialdom and to the city."

"He should be reinstated, nominally, in order that he might get his pension, with the understanding that an able officer will do his work, to beside the mark."

"I am not interested in Captain Robinson's pension," said Mr. Berg, "but I am in that duty, he deserves to lose his pension."

Criticizes Our Democracy

"It seems that Philadelphia has learned nothing from the war," said the Rev. Dr. Samuel Zane Batten, head of the Baptist Social Service.

"The world is struggling toward better things, but Philadelphia clings to her old ideas. We can only hope that when the boys come back and see how our democracy has been deprived they will hold some officials to pretty stiff account. If Philadelphia is an example of the democracy we wish to make in this world, we should be able to spend our blood and treasure to preserve it."

Defense Councils, Public Safety and Other Organizations Quit

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FOUR JERSEY MAYORS START TERMS TODAY

Gloucester, Woodbury, Westville and Wenona Executives Take Oaths of Office

The newly elected mayors of four Jersey towns took oaths of office this noon in their respective executive buildings.

Mayor David M. Anderson entered upon his third term as Mayor of Gloucester. Samuel H. Ladd took his third office as Mayor of Woodbury.

Dr. Charles W. Hamilton, who has held office for six years, again became Wenona's Mayor. James Berry entered office at Westville.

Year's Day marks the entrance of the executives into office and the beginning of the work of the councils in these towns.

The Board of Freeholders in each county also organized at the same hour, when members chosen at the November election took their seats.

At the organization of Gloucester City Council, Chester Pancoast, who began his second term, was elected president. He is a Republican. The new body consists of seven Republicans and two Democrats.

This was the first time in the history of Gloucester that a Republican was elected Mayor. Charles W. Letzow was re-elected city solicitor. His salary was increased from \$1800 per year, with no fees for collecting delinquent water rents and property taxes. The penalty and cost in the future will go into the city treasury.

Robert A. Lincoln was elected superintendent of streets. Edward J. Stetson, a member of the board of assessors; John M. Arms, chief of the waterworks; Dr. J. A. Heck, city physician; Robert A. Hamilton and Henry Vardley, members of the Board of Health. The offices of Clerk of the Waterworks and City Clerk were combined.

These facts were given in an explanation of a declaration Sunday by Stephen Pichon, Foreign Minister, in the Chamber of Deputies.

Referring to the manner in which France would deal with Asia Minor and nationalities once ruled by Turkey, M. Pichon said:

"Our rights are incontestable in Armenia, Syria, Lebanon and Palestine. They are based on historic convictions and on more recent contracts. Although admitting the entire liberty of the Peace Conference to deal with the subject, we consider our rights as established fully by our agreement with Great Britain, America and Italy."

Under consideration, with its complexity of nationalities and religions, will be placed under international protection. England would be responsible for the Arabian peninsula, with the exception of the Kingdom of Hedjaz, which would be free.
