SOLDIER LONGS FOR HOME Corporal Luciani, Twice Wounded, Writes to Sister 'France is a beautiful country, but there is no country on earth that can equal the United States, and it will be home to me when I get back to Philadelphia. This is the happiest day of my life when I get back to Philadelphia. I am getting so fat and lazy that I don't know what I will do when I get home.' Private Adams is twenty-five years old. He went from this city with the first draft quota in 1917, and was later transferred to France, where he was killed in March of last year. 'KILLED' SOLDIERS VERY MUCH ALIVE

Errors Made by War Department Cause Complications in Families

Two soldiers reported killed in action are known to be alive and well and the error has caused no end of complications for their families. Private William J. Stiemmer is still in the service in France. The War Department reported him killed in action at Chateau-Thierry and subsequently announced that he was discharged last July. Similar complications were connected with Captain Bolton of the United States army. He returned to this city last Sunday, although the War Department reported him dead last September. In the Stiemmer case the government has demanded that the soldier's mother return \$87.50 allotment money which was sent to her from July 15 to October 31 last. Mrs. Stiemmer lives at 2215 Sepviva street. She says she has received no money from the War Department since last October. Her son informed her that he never received a cent of pay since he left Camp Hancock last April. Furthermore, money sent to Stiemmer by his father has not been received by the soldier in France. To further complicate matters the insurance company which paid money to Mrs. Stiemmer as a result of the War Department's notice of the soldier's death demands the return of this money. It is the belief of the War Department that the insurance company, East York and Sepviva streets, which held a memorial service for Stiemmer does not feel kindly toward the government.

CAMDEN HERO CITED

General Pershing Bestows War Cross on Private Angelo Private Joseph T. Angelo, Camden, has been cited for bravery and awarded the D. S. C. by General Pershing. According to the War Department, he saved the life of the commanding officer of the Headquarters Company, First Tank Corps, when he dashed within forty feet of the muzzle of the German machine gun under heavy fire and carried his commander to a shell hole. The citation follows: 'When Napoleon found a brave man he acclaimed him a hero and placed on his breast a medal. The man was a hero and the envy of his companions. Today a voice greater than that speaks to me from a mile away, the mighty voice of 100,000,000 people peal forth their shrill of victory, and their shrill music to our souls of the extraordinary brave in action for the end of time. Your name is written on the pages of history, for you have faced death and been not afraid. 'Be brave and cool in peace as you have been in war, and remember that hands have slaved to support you before the enemy, who is certain to have died and never received the reward that you now receive. I thank you.'
