

GIRL VICTIM OF FIEND

Choked and Beaten on Malvern Road. Arrest is Made. West Chester, Pa., Sept. 10.—Miss Mary Gunkle, seventeen years old, daughter of William W. Gunkle, of Church street, Malvern, is in a serious condition from injuries and shock, at her home, as the result of an attack upon her, and Norman Robinson, a Maryland negro, who had been working on Pennsylvania Railroad repairs near Malvern for some time, is in prison, where he is being held on orders of District Attorney Wade for a further hearing before Justice of the Peace Ruth, of Malvern, who committed him following a preliminary examination.

MEXICO PROTESTS

INVASION BY AIR. Energetic Objection Addressed to U. S. Against Planes Crossing the Border. CARRANZA'S FOES APPEAL. By the Associated Press. Mexico City, Sept. 10.—An energetic protest against American army planes crossing the frontier into Mexican territory has been addressed to the United States State Department by the Mexican Government, according to a declaration made last night by Salvador de Diego Fernandez, in charge of the foreign affairs department. He said that the acts protested against had taken place in Sonora, Chihuahua, Coahuila and Lower California.

GOSSIP OF THE STREET
