

'SHIMMY COCKTAIL' SELLER GOES FREE

Federal Agent Says It Tasted Like Whisky, but Proof Is Lacking

ONE SALOONKEEPER HELD

What is a "shimmy cocktail"? Inability of federal agents to answer this question was responsible for freeing Harry Schwartz, a saloonkeeper at 1113 Poplar street, examined yesterday by T. Henry Wallis, assistant United States district attorney, on a charge of selling and keeping for sale intoxicating liquors.

According to the saloonkeeper, a "shimmy" is made of cracked ice, ginger ale and "something else." According to Deputy collector at Internal Revenue John Kelly, "something else" tastes like whisky. But all he could produce as evidence, except the memory and a bottle of "Virginia Dare," so Schwartz was freed.

Matthew Maus, fifth street and Girard avenue, and John McGarvey, 2120 1/2 street, were each held in \$1000 bail for court. Maus, a saloonkeeper, is charged with violating the wartime prohibition act, and McGarvey with selling intoxicating liquor and keeping it for sale.

McGarvey admitted a federal agent to the Ellsworth club, in company with two intoxicated men, whose names were known there, after federal agents were refused admission.

To the club, it is alleged, three members threatened the agent with empty bottles. Agents outside read a search warrant and McGarvey admitted them. Five bottles of whisky and some 275 per cent beer were taken by the agents and shown as evidence.

McGarvey's attorney contended that the liquor was the property of the club.

PRINCE TO DECORATE THREE FROM HERE

British Distinguished Conduct Medals for Philadelphia Tank Corps Veterans

Three Philadelphia soldiers, members of the 201st Battalion, American Tank Corps, will receive the British Distinguished Conduct Medal from the hands of the Prince of Wales, either November 13, at Washington, or November 22, at New York.

This information was received today in telegrams from the military attaché of the British embassy. The medal is the highest decoration Great Britain gives to noncommissioned men.

The men to be decorated are Sergeant Napoleon E. Jaxiel, 2317 North Thirteenth street; Corporal Frank W. Osmond, 1232 North Fifty-third street, and Private Robert F. Wicker, 1915 North Eighteenth street. Corporal Osmond and Private Wicker also won the American Distinguished Medal and the latter has two additional citations. Wicker, who was a professional boxer known in the roped arena as Monte Britt, said today he wasn't sure what he was getting the decoration for.
