

Gimbels—Foremost in Overcoats

This is a shaggy, colorful season. The ulster is the thing—town ulster, not too long for motor wear; the full ulster, for protection under all conditions. Ulsters at \$35 and more.

Even the fur-lined overcoat has not of necessity a black shell, but loftier fabric than the old broadcloth, and in heather, and grays and greens.

Sedan was leveled by the war, but Scotland sends us the luxurious Crombie Montagnac. Full silk lined, velvet piped edges. Coats at \$85.

Ireland is contributing great fabrics for overcoats—there are twenty O'Brien woolens on show. The garments \$75 and \$85.

James Regan won and held fame by holding to virgin wool, no matter what the temptation to "mix." Regan is dead—but his mill holds firms. We are said to use 11 per cent of the fabrics that came to America.

Irish frieze is "scarce as hen's teeth." We seem to have the bulk of the genuine—and beware of counterfeits in anything.

"Lofty" — that's the word — thick, warm stuff that you seem almost to look into. Aberdown is one of the English favorites. Chinchilla is a "has-been"—the softer "moss-finish" is in.

"Baltic Frieze" is a trade name that stands for great ulster stuff—and we've had the ulsters worsted lined; they are wind and waterproof. \$35.
