

HELFFERICH DEFIES COHEN'S INQUIRIES

Refuses to Recognize Deputy and Pays 300 Marks for Insult

PROBERS ARE IN QUANDRY

By the Associated Press Berlin, Nov. 17.—Dr. Karl Helfferich, former German vice chancellor, who was fined 300 marks for refusing to answer a question by Deputy Cohen at the inquiry of the subcommittee of the assembly on war responsibility, counted out the money and placed it on the table.

Deputy Cohen replaced Herr Werthum as chairman, Herr Werthum having declared his disagreement with the committee's decision. The new chairman became engaged at the evening demonstration to exclude the newspapermen and others if there was a repetition.

Deputy Cohen, who was the cause of the imposition of the fine, asked Dr. Helfferich his reasons for the snub. The former vice chancellor charged the leader of the Independent Socialists, with having accepted funds from Joffe, the Russian Bolshevik propagandist, and said that with those funds the radicals had carried on their propaganda, resulting in the "melting" of the army and general internal collapse. He said he could not recognize Cohen out of patriotic motives.

"You can prosecute me to the limit," he added, "but no power on earth can force me to answer Cohen."

Deputy Cohen denied the charges and bitterly attacked Helfferich's Pan-German agitation. He accused him of being responsible for the German breakdown.

Copenhagen, Nov. 17.—Philip Scheidegger, former German chancellor, writing in the Vorwaerts, says he considers Germany really in the power of the reactionaries.

MEXICO DENIES ARMS STORY

Declares Foreign Minister Isn't Seeking New Contracts Mexico City, Nov. 17.—(By A. P.)—Denial that General Camillo Aguilar, Mexican foreign minister, went to Europe to negotiate new contracts for munitions is made by Juan Barragan, chief of staff for President Carranza. The statement says his errand was to arrange with factories in Belgium and Spain either for shipment of arms and ammunition or the return of money paid as initial payments on contracts entered into during the Diaz and Huerta regimes.

NO VERDICT ON WATERLAND

Supreme Council, However, Gives German Tankers to Britain Paris, Nov. 17.—(By A. P.)—The status of the Emperor and other German ships aggregating 170,000 tons, now in the possession of the United States, was discussed by the supreme council today, but no action was taken. Great Britain has claimed that the action of the United States shipping board in retaining the vessels violates the agreement in the council that they should be turned over to the British as soon as they had finished transporting American troops.
