MAYOR SHUNS TILT IN CONGRESS FIGHT

Refuses to Enter Controversy With Lambertson on Stand in Coming Election

CAMPAIGN THREATENS SPLIT

Mayor Moore said today he does not wish to enter a controversy over the Fifth Congressional situation with Sheriff Lambertson or with any one else.

The Mayor favors the candidacy of Congressman Costello. Mr. Lambertson has openly espoused the cause of James J. Connelly, of the Twenty-fifth ward, whose campaign threatens to divide the anti-Vare forces.

In a formal statement this morning Mr. Moore declared: "As to the Fifth congressional district, the Mayor declines to enter into a controversy with Sheriff Lambertson or any one else. A primary election coming off in the Fifth Congressional district and three candidates, Costello, Lambertson and Connelly are contesting for the nomination."

"Under the party rules they all have a right to run. The Mayor is not fomenting discord in any district." Alfred M. Waldron is the Vare candidate in the Fifth district.

Mr. Costello, the incumbent, is in line for the chairmanship of the House committee on rivers and harbors. Administration leaders believe his reelection will put him at the head of that committee which is vitally important in the movement for deeper waterways.

Charles Delany is carrying the fight into the home ballparks of Harry C. Ramsey, Vare candidate. The second ward, Ramsey's home, was the scene of a meeting addressed by Delany. A defensive rally, at which Congressman William S. Vare and Ramsey were the chief speakers, also was held.

The Delany meeting was held at 320 Washington avenue. Harry Trauer's announcement that Ramsey's strength would be greatly curtailed by the striking from the voting lists of 300 phantom voters was cheered.

PONIES WIN FAVOR AT BIG INDOOR SHOW

Juvenile Riders Draw Applause at Opening of Exhibition at Armory

CONTINUES TILL SATURDAY

Classes for ponies, in which juvenile riders won the applause and admiration of horse lovers gathered in the Third Regiment Armory, Broad and Federal streets, opened Philadelphia's ninth annual indoor horse show this afternoon.

Entries in the various classes, which are said to make up the largest indoor show ever held here, will be judged this afternoon and tonight, all day tomorrow and up until late Saturday night.

The first entries entered the oval early this afternoon to compete in a class for novice ponies in harness. This was followed by classes for ponies under saddle, harness and saddle horses and ponies and hunters. The last two classes this afternoon for hunters to be shown over six successive jumps are expected to furnish the thrills of the opening events.

The proceeds of the three-day show will be given to eight hospitals, the Jefferson, Howard, Bane, Oculic, Garrison, Samaritan, Polyclinic and American.

Reginald C. Vanderbilt came over from New York to act especially as judge of harness entries. Major Jackson, of Moynan, who has for the last eight years been a popular judge of the shows here, is at the show to judge hunters. He will be made to suit the time until late tomorrow afternoon, when he leaves for London to act as a judge in the great Olympia show to be given there within a few weeks.

NORTH'S ICY BREATH MAKES CITY SHIVER

Winds Off Frozen Fields of Arctic Regions Responsible for Cool Spell

NO CHANGE IN SIGHT

High atmospheric pressure over the northern states, resulting in winds from the ice regions in the north and northwest, is responsible for the continued spell which this section has experienced in the last week.

According to Weather Forecaster Bliss there is no indication that the conditions will change in the immediate future.

While temperatures have averaged 5 degrees below the seasonal condition since the first of the month, the weather has not reached a record-breaking point by any means.

The lowest temperature experienced during the cool spell was 42 degrees on May 3. Weather bureau records show a temperature of 36 degrees on the same date a few years ago and the same temperature on May 6 of the same year.

Saturday the temperature was 3 degrees below the seasonal average. Sunday it dropped to 7 degrees below the average.

Monday it was 6 degrees under spring form. Tuesday 3 and yesterday 6.

Fair and continued moderately cool tonight and Friday, with variable winds, is the official edict of the prognosticators.

"The fact that the cool spell comes at a time when the weather should be moderately warm," Mr. Bliss said, "causes people to feel it more. The consequence is that they believe it is colder than it really is. We cannot see any change from the conditions in the immediate future."
