

19TH ARTILLERY LEAVES FOR DIX

First Troops of "Show Battalion" March Down Market Street to Ferry

MOSTLY VETERANS OF WAR

"Early birds" in Philadelphia this morning had a good look at the regulars in the Second Battalion of the Nineteenth Field Artillery, which clattered and rumbled through the city on its way to Camp Dix from Fort Meyer, Va.

First troops of this "show battalion" to come through were the men of the train, taking eight heavily loaded army trucks down Market street to the Reading ferry. They crossed the river at 7 o'clock. Back of them about forty-five minutes, came the balance of the command, which had been encamped at Sixty-first street and Baltimore avenue.

In the battalion are 500 officers and men and about 300 horses. The long line of 75th, the caissons, the rolling kitchens and wagons gave Market street a martial air. Captain J. M. Swing is in command.

The Nineteenth Field Artillery served with the Fifth Division in France and most of the men in the regiment now are overseas veterans, with a sprinkling of picked recruits. This is the first long march since the return of the regiment to this country.

At Camp Dix the battalion will begin a severe course of drill and general training.

TO MAKE HEALTH SURVEY

Physicians to Prescribe Exercises at Recreation Centers

The Department of Public Welfare, according to an announcement made by its chief physician, Dr. Blair Spencer, will make a health survey of the tens of thousands of boys and girls who go to the recreation centers of the city.

The plan, started after a conference with the Philadelphia Health Commission, is that two physicians will be appointed to hold a clinic at ten recreation centers. The object of these clinics will be to discover any incipient illness among the children and guide them in treatment and the exercises most beneficial to them.
