Sir Thomas's Record in Quest for Cup

Not once, in his three previous attempts to lift the trophy, has his challenger been able even to get "a leg up" on it. The record follows: 1899.—The Columbia, America's yacht, won all three races from Shamrock.

1901.—Shamrock II beaten again by Columbia in all three. Although the challenger was faster, the many elements of maritime luck were against him. 1903.—Shamrock III went to its defeat in every race in the contest with the Resolute.

1920.—Shamrock IV has won two races. So has Resolute. Today's contest is the deciding one.

LOCAL ATHLETES LEAD AMERICA IN ROWING

Philadelphia's Own, Six in Number, May Lead the World in Olympic Aquatic Events

SIX more of Philadelphia's own athletes have proved themselves the class of America, and by virtue of their hard-earned victories on the waters of Lake Quinsigamond, Worcester, Mass., have been selected to represent the United States in the Antwerp Olympiad.

These bronzed young men who have spread the fame of Philadelphia's bantam rowing around the world are: Jack Kelly, Vesper Club, winner of the national senior sculls championship and joint winner of the doubles title. Paul Costello, Vesper Club, joint winner with Kelly in double-sculling championship race.

When the Penn quartet captured the international race on Friday great was the applause of the spectators. It was too much to hope that they would come through on Saturday, but they not only won but won handily. They trimmed the famed "Cotton" Club 1919 title winners, by four lengths, doing the mile and a quarter, which incidentally was the distance of all the races, as it is near the 2000-meter Olympic distance, in 7:14.

CHEERY FAREWELL FOR U. S. ATHLETES

New York Extends Best Wishes to Sport Army Off for Olympics

New York, July 26.—An army of American athletes will sail this afternoon to conquer the world in the field of play and at noon today New York, which is embarking on the Princess Matoka for the Olympic games at Antwerp.

The American Olympic team on the Princess is composed of 108 track and field men, forty-eight swimmers, twenty-four wrestlers, twenty-two boxers, twenty fencers and eight bicycle riders.

There were four Olympic trials, and three of them were won by Philadelphia. They were six title events on Saturday, and four of them were capped by a victory of Philadelphia over the United States. Later, the Philadelphia crew will represent America at Antwerp, and not the Navy.
