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VIOLENT EARTHQUAKE AGAIN ROCKS NORTHERN ITALY

Republican Fund Raiser Tells of Plan to Secure Money Under Quotas Fixed for 54 Cities

\$500,000 DAMAGE DONE IN FIRE THAT SWEEPS FACTORIES

Fifteen Firemen Slightly Hurt When Wall of S. Front Street Building Collapses

EXPLOSIONS FOLLOW PATH OF FLAMES IN PAINT WORKS

Four Plants Are Virtually Destroyed During Spectacular Blaze



Buildings from 1400 to 1436 South Front street are swept in spectacular blaze that does \$500,000 damage. Several heavy explosions attended the fire. Fifteen firemen were slightly injured when a wall collapsed.

Fire, featured by explosions and falling walls, destroyed the factories at 1400 to 1436 South Front street, early today, and in damage estimated at more than \$500,000.

The fire began in the engine room of A. Stetel & Son, brush and broom makers, at 1400-20 South Front street. Patrolman Wirtzschauer saw the blaze and sounded the alarm at 3:15 o'clock.

When the engines arrived the flames already had spread to the factories of the Osada Mantel Co., fancy woodworkers, at 1422 South Front street, and S. F. Basch & Co., interior woodworkers, 1424-26 South Front street.

Two more alarms were turned in, but despite the arrival of additional firemen, the flames spread to the Maxwell Paint Works, at 1428-36 South Front street.

Firemen narrowly escaped injury fighting the flames in the paint works when turpentine and other explosives were touched by the fire and exploded.

Fifteen firemen were buried in the big bricks and mortar from a rear wall on Howard street when it collapsed. All received minor injuries, but no one was hurt seriously.

So great was the reflection of the fire that the crew of the fireboat Stuart, at Race street wharf, saw it and raced to the foot of Reed street to be of any assistance.

The fire threatened the stable of Walter Patterson, at 1438 South Front street. Working in the dense smoke, firemen unfolded twelve hoses and tried to save the building.

Sparks from the blazing factories fell in the lumber yard of Charles Benton on the opposite side of Front street, but a constant stream of water from the neighborhood station on lumber piles extinguished them.

Several electric wires fell during the fire, and the reflecting the firemen and others on the scene.

Firemen had a hard job keeping the flames from spreading to other nearby buildings. Some residents of the neighborhood, fearing the fire, began to attempt, began to move their household goods.

Traffic on Front street and on Reed street was stopped for some time because of the fire. The blaze burnt itself out in a comparatively short time because of the nature of the products.

The new brick Stetel factory is estimated at \$200,000, and that of the other concerns about \$300,000.

WON'T REINSTATE ARSENAL WORKMEN

Baker Refuses to Reopen Case and Appeal May Be Made to President

UNFAIR, CLAIMS UNION

The cases of three men, one from the Frankford and two from the Rock Island arsenals, were made an issue by the International N. C. Alphas, president of Washington, District 44 of the machinists' union, which announced in all government employes, announced that he would appeal from Secretary Baker's decision to President Wilson.

The secretary of war made his ruling after his former private secretary, Stanley King, of Boston, had made an investigation. In making his ruling Secretary Baker considered the contents of the letter from the chief of ordnance of the army with a view to reaching an agreement for the operation of shop committees at the arsenals.

Mr. Alphas is taking his appeal to the President on the ground that Secretary Baker's ruling violates the admitted principle of collective bargaining. "The man discharged at Frankford was a member of the employes' shop committee. He had been in the government service for fifteen years. All three of the men had high efficiency ratings until they were arbitrarily reduced, following their service on shop committees, to the point where they were discharged for alleged inefficiency. We hold the men were clearly discriminated against and propose to fight out whether this policy is to be maintained hereafter by the government plants where the men have formed shop committees."

WOMAN ROBBED, BEATEN

Wife of Patrolman Loses Ring and Is Assaulted

Mrs. William A. Jackson, of 5716 DeLancey street, wife of a traffic squad patrolman, was held up and robbed at 10 o'clock last night at Fifteenth and Market streets.

Four young men in a touring car, foreigners, Mrs. Jackson believes, stopped at the curb as she was walking down Fifteenth street after getting off a car at Market. Two jumped out and, while one kept guard, the other covered her to put up her hands, which she did.

The thief saw the flash of a diamond ring she was wearing, worth \$75, and took it. He also took her watch and a pair of handbags containing a few dollars in change. He then struck her on the jaw, dazed her, and the four escaped.

Mrs. Jackson was the victim of hold-up in a similar fashion near Spruce street near Fifty-ninth. At that time she jabbed at the robber with a hatpin and frightened him off.

G. O. P. COMMITTEE SEEKS HARMONY

Communication From Watson to Women's Body Is Regarded as an Apology

The Republican city committee extended the olive branch today to the Republican women's committee, headed by Mrs. Walter S. Thomson.

A letter from Thomas F. Watson, chairman of the city committee, expressing the committee's desire to "work in harmony" with the women for the success of the Republican ticket this fall, was read at a meeting of Mrs. Thomson's committee at headquarters, 506 South Broad street.

This and a statement by Mrs. Archibald R. Harmon, who has organized a Harding-Coolidge club, that she is not lined up with the Vares, featured women's political activities today.

A week ago the Republican women engaged in a lively tilt with the Vares members of the city committee, and this was followed by sharp accusations against the motives of the women by Coroner Knight, who said they were "publicity seekers" and "insincere."

Today's communication from Watson is regarded as an apology for the attitude of some of the Vares members. It is given with the full approval of Mrs. Thomson's committee, and a reply will be forwarded in the same spirit, Mrs. Thomson said.

The letter, addressed to Mrs. Thomson, follows:

"As chairman of the Republican city committee, I take this means of assurance to the Republican women's committee in Philadelphia, and to the women workers in harmony with the Republican ticket this fall."

"I note with pleasure that more than 250,000 women have been enrolled upon the national lists in Philadelphia, and I sincerely hope that through the joint efforts of all Republican organizations the names of all Republican women in Philadelphia will be placed upon the registration lists, so that an unprecedented majority may be rolled up for Harding and Coolidge and the entire Republican ticket."

"Now that the nineteenth amendment is part of the fundamental law of the nation, and earnest co-operation between the women and the men who are Republicans and no differences of any character should be permitted to interfere with this co-operation."

"Let me assure you that the city committee stands ready to work with you in every way possible, and to help you in the matter of completing the assessment, getting out a full registration and rolling the largest Republican vote possible."

"To that end the city committee hereby extends to your committee an invitation to avail itself of all facilities at our disposal, and assures you of our desire to assist in every way."

"In this connection let me say that I have requested Leopold Glass, counsel for the city committee, to take charge of preparing and presenting in court petitions of women who have applied to your committee to be placed upon the assessment, and the total of which I am informed, will be in the neighborhood of 2000."

"I have not lined up" with the Vares. I do not even know the Vares." This was the statement today of Mrs. Archibald R. Harmon, who launched a Harding-Coolidge Club for women at Republican City Committee headquarters, Eleventh and Chestnut streets.

Because of her support of Judge Patterson, Vares candidate in the last mayoralty campaign, and the fact she was given the assessment by all Republican women's office, Mrs. Harmon said an impression had gotten broadcast that she was working in the interest of the Vares.

Mrs. Harmon declared at today's meeting she had joined no political faction and was interested solely in the election of Harding and Coolidge. She issued an appeal to all Philadelphia women to join the organization. No money will be solicited, Mrs. Harmon said.

BLAIR ASSERTS HIS FINANCIAL IDEAS WERE REJECTED

Upham's Assistant Says National Committee Had Part in Assessments

DOCUMENT IS READ TO SENATE PROBERS

Impossible to Carry Out Program—Philadelphia Was Not Organized

By the Associated Press Chicago, Sept. 9.—Charges by Governor Cox that the Republicans had fixed quotas and planned intensive fundraising drives in at least fifty-one cities, and that the national committee had had a part in assessing the city quotas, were admitted on the stand before the Senate investigating committee today by Harry M. Blair, assistant to Fred W. Upham, Republican national treasurer.

Reading from a document produced by Mr. Blair, which, he said, was sent out in lieu of the much-discussed "Form 101," Senator Reed brought out that the treasurer's office planned to organize intensive drives in fifty-four cities, three more than the Ohio governor mentioned when he read his list of fifty-one at Pittsburg.

From the same document Senator Reed read that the local chairman appointed in each city was to accept the quota placed upon the city by the national treasurer.

"But he never did that to my knowledge," Mr. Blair interjected. He explained that the plan in his mind was for the state chairman of the ways and means committee to select chairmen in cities who then would be confirmed by Mr. Upham "to make it official," and that Mr. Upham should pass on to the local chairman a city quota suggested by the state chairman.

Blair's ideas rejected

His testimony at many points showed "but the plan which he had in his mind were rejected by his superiors when placed on paper, which was the fate of 'Form 101.'"

Cox's Copy Incomplete

Mr. Blair produced a copy of that form and when it was compared to the copy of the same form which Governor Cox had sent to the committee by Edmund H. Moore, his personal representative, the governor's copy was found to be incomplete. An entire paragraph which would be confirmed by the paragraph suggested that contributions of \$5000 to \$10,000 be accepted in Minneapolis, St. Paul, Dulles and Houston as cities where the drives were abandoned because it was "not expedient," he said, to start them.

"Our experience in Atlanta was not so encouraging," he explained, referring to the testimony yesterday of C. W. McClure, Georgia state chairman, about the failure of the drive there.

"You did that to contemplate organizing drives in fifty-four cities," Senator Reed asked.

"Yes sir."

"So if Governor Cox or any other man who has planned organizing in fifty-one cities, he simply understood, didn't he?"

"Yes sir."

Mr. Blair testified that one copy of "form 101" which, he said, was never issued, when the national ways and means committee rejected it, had gone out of his office.

Like Other Fund Drives

Either Harvey H. Mather, Kansas ways and means chairman, or Paul C. Gilbert, Kansas director, had received it, he said.

Senator Reed attempted to bring out that the document which Mr. Blair said composed form 101 was not intended for that purpose and asked how Dudley S. Blossom, of Cleveland, who testified yesterday, had been able to follow the "form 101" plan exactly if he had never seen it.

Mr. Blair explained that the campaign plan was commonly used for money drives for hospitals, Y. M. C. A. buildings and in war drives, and that all his assistants had worked in such activities and knew the general procedure.

Senator Reed read from the subcommittee report a plan of campaign was appended and asked for a copy of that plan.

"Why, that was 'form 101,'" Mr. Blair said, but later withdrew his answer on the ground that he had misunderstood the question and declared

FEAR GREAT LOSS OF LIFE IN ITALY

Another violent earthquake, more severe than that on Tuesday, which killed more than 1000 persons, shakes Italy.

This new shock was in the northeastern section in the Emilia district, while the first happened in the northwestern section.

No particulars as to the number dead, or the damage done have yet been received, but it is thought that the death list will reach horrible proportions.

Loss of Life and Important Damage in Area of 8000 Square Miles

KING VICTOR EMMANUEL VISITS STRICKEN DISTRICTS

Promises to Care for Woman's Grandchildren; 10,000 Homeless; Hospitals Crowded

By the Associated Press Rome, Sept. 9.—Another violent earthquake occurred in the Emilia district at 2:35 o'clock this morning, causing the loss of lives and important damage.

The communities suffering the most were Reggio, Ospedaletti, Russana, Toano and Cavola. This morning's shock was more violent than that of Tuesday.

[The Emilia district covers an area of about 7975 square miles in the northeastern part of that country, extending nearly across the peninsula, having its northern end on the Adriatic sea on the east, the Marche and Tuscany on the south, and Piedmont and Liguria on the west. It includes the provinces of Parma, Piacenza, Modena, Reggio and Emilia, Bologna, Ferrara, Forli and Ravenna. Population of this wide territory was estimated in census returns at 2,451,752. Reggio, which is reported to have suffered most in today's earthquake, has a cathedral with many fine statues and monuments; the Church of Madonna dell' Ghiera containing splendid frescoes and other priceless antiquities.]

Fluorence, Sept. 9.—(By A. P.)—The number of dead from Tuesday's earthquake is steadily growing as additional reports come in. The latest news from Pizzanone brings the total of dead there alone up to 482 while in Vicenza 124 are dead and about 1000 injured. It is believed the number of those who lost their lives will aggregate at least 1000.

In nearly three score towns and villages serious damage was done and a total population of more than 10,000 rendered homeless.

Signor Micheli, the minister of agriculture, is visiting the outlying mountain districts, and giving all the assistance possible.

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Fifty dead victims have been taken from the ruins of the town of Barga, and many more are buried in the debris of their homes. The village of Grafagnana is a heap of ruins and the survivors have fled. The village has been destroyed, and thousands are homeless at Tassalido, Cattolico, Monteceto and Ceserano.

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
