ISSUE LICENSES**

Jack Dempsey Gets Permit No. 1 From New York State Commission

New York, Sept. 17.—The sport of boxing will be revived tonight under the new law which legalizes fifteen-round bouts. The newly appointed State Boxing Commission, of which Joseph Johnson is chairman and the license commission, headed by Lawrence McGuire, of the New York Athletic Club, today approved and issued licenses to the Madison Square Garden Boxing Club, of this city, and the Quaker City, of Philadelphia.

Frank A. Tierney, an Albany newspaperman, was appointed first deputy state boxing commissioner, and Harry S. Lyons, temporary acting secretary for both commissions. No secretary for either committee had been appointed, but it is expected selections for these offices will be announced in a few days.

Jack Dempsey, of Salt Lake City, world's heavyweight champion, who made a personal application, was granted boxer's license No. 1. The other boxers who were given their permits were Johnny Dundee, Joe Galante, Joe Bonanno, of Philadelphia; Andy Chaney, Tommy Noble, Pete Hartley, Sammy Noble and Robert Hanson.
