FINLEY'S PLACE

Vare City Committeeman Gets  
Council Nomination for  
First District

ILLEGAL, SAYS TRAINER

Charles J. Pommer, Vare city committeeman from the First ward, and a tipstaff in common pleas court No. 2, was named the Republican nominee for Council from the First district today by the Republican city committee. The nomination is for the unexpired term of William E. Finley, who died recently. The action was taken after the city committeemen, representing the First district, met in convention and endorsed Pommer. The city committee first took up the question of the legality of the nomination, voting 26 to 16 in favor of the procedure. Later the vote on the nomination was 26 to 16 in favor of Pommer, the "noes" refusing to vote.

Works to be included in the 1921 budget of \$1,250,000 to be used in the carrying on of the work in this territory between South street and Columbia avenue, river to river.

Short and Long Term Loan

In the event of the city doing the work for the entire municipality on and after October 1, 1921, the cost of the entire equipment, including stables, garages, ground and buildings necessary, will be about \$2,100,000.

May Fight in Courts

Mr. Trainer will probably seek an injunction to restrain the city committee from printing the name of Pommer on the official ballot as that of the Republican nominee. In this way the whole question of the method of making the nomination, whether by party convention or in an open primary, will be brought before the courts for settlement.

Denies Self-Government

"The Republican party has thrived on the Lincoln principle, a government of the people, by the people and for the people. The proposed action of this committee to carry out, and to destroy this fundamental doctrine so long revered throughout our nation and renders void the very spirit and fairness of our existing primary election laws and denies the right of self-government to the qualified electors of the district."

Cost in Central Section

"For the central section, namely, from South street to Columbia avenue, the cost of the work for the year 1921 is \$1,450,000, while the cost for the same district in 1920 is about \$1,007,800."

Cities Previous Contest

"One who goes in the primary for councilmen, Harry Hazzard, who was in sympathy with the present city administration, was defeated by Edwin R. Cox by a majority of 10,773. Four months later the Vare representatives in his faction had an opponent for the state Senate in his district William Reinhardt, who espoused the cause of our present city administration."

The chairman of the Finance committee also reported to Council with a favorable recommendation of the thirty-year general improvement loan bill.

Employment Reduced
