Speaker Again in Spotlight TRIS SPEAKER was the hero again, and his sensational fielding was the talk of the town and Brooklyn. The Cleveland manager was all over the outfield. Once he dashed in and robbed Kilduff of a sure double with a shoestring catch. Another time he invaded Jameson's territory to rob Wheat. He also romped into right field to pull down a long fly. There have been outfielders in this great game of baseball, but none can compare with Trisman.

"He's the greatest I ever have seen," said Billy Murray, one of the Phillies managers' alumni. "Speaker is better than Farrell, Jimmy McAleer and all of the other old-timers you can mention. He can go in, run back, travel sideways and get the ball. He plays grander like an infielder and at bat—why there's no comparison. Ty Cobb might have been good, but never was in Speaker's class for all-around work."

"The only player who can cause an argument now is Eddie Rousch. In the 1919 series Eddie could have caught nineteen fly balls in the first game, as he was behind left and right fielders every time a ball was hit out there. But Eddie is not in Speaker's class."

SPEAKER did a lot of well guessing on Tuesday and qualified as the Master Mind of the game. He did the same today when he crossed the dope and selected Slim Caldwel to start the third game instead of Walter Mills.

Tris Again Crosses the Dope THE experts were sure that the left-hander would be on the mound. "It's certain that Mills will be used," they said, "and today is the day. The reason for this is he will be used in Cleveland and needs a long rest. Mills is the choice."

Manager Spoke, however, had different ideas and was influenced in a way by Caldwell himself. "There isn't a team in the world that can beat me in a world series," Caldwell told Speaker this morning. "I know how to pitch to those Brooklyn guys and all I want is a chance. I will beat them sure."

Speaker told him to get ready and do the best he could, and incidentally Tris has a lot of confidence in the eccentric hurler. Last season, after Slim had been let out by the Yankees and nobody wanted him, Speaker claimed him at the waiver price. Caldwell snapped and was given a heart-to-heart talk on the first day.

"If you want to kick over the traces," he was told, "don't be afraid to let me go. I can not bring detectives to watch you, but am leaving your fate in your own hands. I want you to be in shape to pitch every fourth day. See that you are."

This was new treatment for Caldwell. For a time he didn't know what to make of it, but when he realized he was put upon his honor, no ball player ever worked harder. He pitched a no-hit game and was one of the mainstays on the mound. This year he also has been going good, and today Speaker showed the confidence he had in him.

"THIS defeat means nothing to us," said Spoke. "I wouldn't be surprised if we won the next four games. We can outpace the Brooklyn club, and that means a whole lot. Their pitchers will not annoy us."


Johnston was up in a pinch three times yesterday and never delivered. Burns was up once and drew a base on balls. The change would help Cleveland considerably.

A worn valve guide will allow enough air to be sucked into the cylinder to cause misfiring and also permit oil to leak out. The plunger inside the tire valve is essential for the well-being of the tire and should never be removed unless absolutely necessary.

No part of a car requires more careful attention in the matter of lubrication than the steering gear and its connections. Lack of a sufficient amount of lubricant causes undue wear, and when one of these parts breaks a serious accident may result.
