Commission Will Consider Semi-Monthly Payments to End Loan Shark Evil

Stotenburg, Emory McMichael, Mayor Moore, Richard Wiegand, president of Council; Chief Davis, of the Water Bureau, and Chief Webster, of the Surveys Bureau. The last four are members by virtue of their respective offices.
