Twelve counties will be covered by the ten women who leave Philadelphia Monday for a speaking campaign in the interests of Senator Harding and Governor Coolidge. The trip will last until October 30. It will be under the auspices of the Republican women's committee of Pennsylvania.

CITY DEATH RATE LOW

Philadelphia Leads All Others Except New York

Philadelphia stands second only to New York among the cities of the Atlantic seaboard in the matter of low death records for the week ending October 9, figures made public today by the Bureau of Census show.

New York with an average of 9.3 per thousand is low, while Philadelphia has 10.5 per thousand.

The records for other cities are: Boston, 12; Baltimore, 11.9; Jersey City, 11.4; Pittsburgh, 11.3; Richmond, 18.2; Trenton, 20.1; and Washington, 12.

WOMAN IS ROBBED OF \$1527 BY MOVER

North Myrtlewood Street Resident's Money and Bonds Recovered After Chase

SAYS HE HIT HER AND FLED

A woman was knocked down and robbed of \$1527 in cash and Liberty Bonds by a man who was moving furniture for her at 1412 North Myrtlewood street.

Stanley Knowles, of Reno street near Twenty-seventh, is alleged to have made the attack. He was caught near Twenty-sixth and Cabot streets after a long chase. The money was recovered. Knowles had been hired for the day to help Mrs. Mary Ampino move. He worked steadily yesterday morning. In the afternoon he learned the woman had the money and bonds with which she intended making the first payment on her new home.

Knowles saw Mrs. Ampino place a bag containing the money and bonds in a basket. Later the woman missed the bag. She accused Knowles of the theft.

He is alleged to have struck her on the jaw and fled from the house. The woman ran into the street and screamed for help. Patrolman Hartman, of the Twenty-eighth and Oxford streets station, heard the shouts and saw Knowles fleeing. He pursued and captured the man.

FIRE ALARMS RESIDENTS

A fire in the home of Warner J. Steel, 1810 De Lancey place, caused a number of prominent residents of that neighborhood to leave their homes last evening when the clanging of fire bells disturbed them at their dinners.

The belt of a dish-washing machine in the basement of the Steel home became ignited from a sparking motor. Servants attempted to extinguish the blaze, but were driven out by the stifling smoke and an alarm was turned in. The firemen quickly put out the fire with little damage to the property.
