LITHUANIA IN STATE OF PANIC

300 KILLED IN TRAIN COLLISION IN MANCHURIA

Tokyo, Oct. 23.—Special dispatches from Harbin, Manchuria, report three hundred casualties in killed and injured in a collision of trains on the Chinese eastern railway near Harbin. The victims, the reports added, were Russians.

JAPAN'S POLICIES ATTACKED BY OPPOSITION PARTY

Indications of Republican Landslide Apparent to Political Observers

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Chicago, Oct. 23.—A survey of political conditions throughout the country indicates that Harding will carry all the eastern and northern states and all the western states, except four. The border states are in doubt, except Missouri, which will almost certainly go Republican.

STATES CLAIMED FOR HARDING

The following is the list of states which will go to Harding with the number of their electoral votes noted: California, 13; Colorado, 6; Connecticut, 7; Delaware, 3; Idaho, 4; Illinois, 23; Indiana, 15; Iowa, 13; Kansas, 10; Maine, 6; Massachusetts, 15; Michigan, 15; Minnesota, 12; Missouri, 18; Nebraska, 8; New Hampshire, 4; New Jersey, 14; New Mexico, 3; New York, 45; North Dakota, 5; Ohio, 24; Oklahoma, 5; Pennsylvania, 33; Rhode Island, 5; South Dakota, 5; Utah, 4; Vermont, 4; Washington, 7; West Virginia, 8; Wisconsin, 13; Wyoming, 3. Total, 294.

DEMOCRATIC CLAIMS OF VICTORY UNFOUNDED

Maryland and Kentucky are classed as doubtful. Both states inclined to Harding a month ago, but recent developments have swung the balance in both of them. The raising of the race issue has helped the Democrats all along the border. Cardinal Gibbons' declaration for the League of Nations will undoubtedly aid in the swing to the Democrats. Both states are normally Democratic. Their present inclination appears to be toward Cox. On the other hand, the Harding election is big enough, it may carry both of these states.

DEMOCRATIC CLAIMS OF VICTORY UNFOUNDED

Missouri is given to Harding because of the defection of the Democratic party. There Senator Cox's Kansas City speech almost settles the question of Missouri. Reed's going to Wisconsin to make a fight for La Follette's candidacy for the presidency, Thompson, is a notice to his followers of what he cares for party obligations.

Utah is assigned to Harding because the Mormon Church is likely to support the winner and also because the state is normally Republican. DEMOCRATIC CLAIMS OF VICTORY UNFOUNDED

Little information is available regarding the mountain states of Montana and Nevada. The Hamilton county Germans are Republicans this time. The best evidence that California is not doubtful as the Democrats assert is the absence of Hiram Johnson from the state. In a Republican year like this Johnson, who has made many sacrifices to maintain his party regularity, could not afford to have his state go Democratic. If there were any danger of doing so he would be working in California. He says his state will give Cox 150,000 majority.
