## STATE DEMOCRACY IS FAIRLY CRUSHED

Republicans Get Unprecedented Majorities—May Have 34 Congressmen

## SOCIALIST VOTE SURPRISE

Pennsylvania Republicans as usual "brought home the bacon" yesterday. It was a large and generally lardaceous haul. They left the Democrats barely enough to greet the griddle. By the time what is left of the Democracy gets through expelling its loosened front teeth, and applying arnica and hot fomentations to its election bumps and bruises, it will have sensed the fact that there is neither balm in Gilead nor hope in a political Israel for them when Pennsylvania starts to hand out the real old spazza rough stuff.

## Majority Sets Record

Never was such a majority rolled up in the Keystone state before. Unofficial returns indicate that Harding and Coolidge will have a majority approximately 600,000.

## Philadelphia Alone Gave Them 217,338

Senator Boies Penrose received the largest majority ever given him in the state, despite the fact that he was cut some in this city and quite liberally in the state. This was expected. The cutting was done almost exclusively outside the great cities by the women voters.

## Circumstances Afforded them the rare opportunity of voting against Penrose

and of voting for one of their own sex for United States senator, Leah Cobb Marion, of Enonopolis.

## The Penrose vote in Philadelphia was 286,381, or 19,232 behind Harding.

Leah Cobb Marion polled 11,810.

## Major Farrell Strong

Major John A. Farrell managed to draw out the full Democratic strength in the city and presumably in the state. He received 87,659 votes in Philadelphia. He was hopelessly outclassed from the start. He is a political martyr without the crown.

## As for the city loan bill, it went through all right, but with a protest.

Heavy cutting left the mark on it, and some of the most artistic slashing was done in districts over which Judge Charlie Brown is suzerain.

## Outside the Penrose scratching the remainder of the state ticket, including the four congressmen-at-large, went through on the Harding tidal wave with virtually the same majorities.

Philadelphia supplied all the local high lights that could have been desired. All eyes were on South Philadelphia where the fight centered on the election of a councilman to the seat formerly occupied by the late William E. Finney.

## Moore Against Vare

It was the Moore administration against the Vares. Charles J. Pommer, the contractors' candidate, was opposed by James Gallagher, who had the indorsement of Mayor Moore and the acquiescence of the Trainer brothers.

And the Vares and Charles J. Pommer would handily. Pommer's majority will exceed 7000. Senator Ed Vare guessed 10,000.

## Charles J. Pommer, Vare candidate for City Council in the First district, was swung to victory over James Gallagher, administration candidate, in yesterday's election by the great Harding-Coolidge landslide.

His majority was 7263, with one division missing.

## The election was to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Councilman William E. Finley, who was the close personal and political friend of Senator Vare.

The Pommer-Gallagher contest, the only real fight in the whole city, involved purely local municipal questions, but as the Vare candidate had the Republican nomination, he was carried along with the general Republican tidal wave.

## The "handicapped" vote was so heavy in favor of Gallagher that he was counted upon to put Gallagher over the line, and was swamped and were unable to rally the necessary reserves.

As a consequence Republicans who cut their ticket in favor of Gallagher were not backed up by the Democrats.

## The Pommer vote, while a victory, proved beyond question that many voters in the Vares' home wards are turning away from the contractor bosses.

This is shown by comparing the winner's total vote with the total vote polled last year by Finley.

## 2000 Less Than Finley

Finley was elected with a plurality of 23,000 votes, receiving a total of 25,000, while Pommer, who has the franchise, despite the feminine vote this year, Pommer had about 2000 less than Finley.

## NATION IS SWEEPED BY REPUBLICANS; FIGURES MOUNT

Democrats Are Overwhelmed in All States Except in Solid South

## HARDING SEEMS ASSURED OF 379 ELECTORAL VOTES

East and West Bury Cox and Roosevelt in Avalanches of Votes

New York, Nov. 3.—The Republican landslide continued to roll along in even greater proportions today as belated election returns came in from the West.

Beside electing Harding by a tremendous plurality, it was assured that the Republicans would increase their margin in both houses of Congress, and in the Senate, in particular, would change their precarious control by one to a substantial working majority.

Congressional returns from many states were slow, as were, indeed, the returns on the vote for President. But on the basis of actual returns at hand and indications from partial returns coming in, it seemed that Harding would have not less than 380 votes in the electoral college, with a probability of 379, while all that could be counted in the Cox column were the 127 votes from the solid South.
