

TAFT SAYS HARDING WILL SPEED PEACE

Former President Denies Election Result Is Slap at League of Nations

MERELY PURGES COVENANT

(Reprinted from Public Ledger) Copyright, 1920, by Public Ledger Co. New Haven, Conn., Nov. 4.—William Howard Taft yesterday gave out the following statement exclusively for the Public Ledger:

The sweeping character of the Republican victory most people expected, but that it should reach the unprecedented proportions which it has reached was a surprise. The majority of a million in New York for Mr. Harding will stand out in the political history of the country, and is not likely to be repeated for many, many years, if ever.

There will be divergent views as to the meaning of the election, and yet most observers will conclude that the election is nothing but the culmination of a trend against Mr. Wilson's administration that began before the war closed and before the League of Nations was in controversy at all, that manifested itself in the election of 1918, and that continued to grow in momentum until Tuesday last.

Aided by League Enemies There are localities where the League of Nations doubtless played an important part, particularly Article X. The Irish and the Germans were especially bitter against any league of nations which included Great Britain, and responded to the arguments made by the opponents of the league with eagerness and emphasis.

The opponents of the league with eagerness and emphasis. This doubtless explains the very large vote for Mr. Harding in New York and Boston, usually Democratic strongholds. The essence of the league will maintain that the general verdict is one completely adverse to any league, but this will not be the reasonable judgment of those who have followed Mr. Harding's promises in his speech of acceptance in his speech of August 28, in his Des Moines speech and his Indianapolis speech.

We may be sure that Mr. Harding will fulfill his agreement with the public, and will begin now to study how he can reach the influential members of the existing league to induce them to enter into a new league of association which shall not have the features of the existing league, to which he has offered serious objection.

Must Eliminate Article X These objections are four-fold. One is to Article X, which, of course, must be eliminated if the United States is to enter a league.

The second is to the character of the reference to the Monroe Doctrine in the League of Nations, which does not brood enough to secure to the United States full right and discretion to assert the Monroe Doctrine as always.

The third is to the character of the tribunals of the present league, in that they are not framed as a court should be, and are not to be constituted of judges and jurists but of diplomatic and executive statesmen and politicians.

For this, therefore, must be substituted an international court of the kind recognized to the existing league by the Root-Phillips commission.

Fourth, he objects to the labor chapter of the league and would not have it operate, except as Congress may voluntarily, when occasion arises, accept its provisions. These, with the subject matter of Republican reservations, constitute all the objections which have been expressed by Mr. Harding.

Election Brings Peace Nearer The resolution declaring peace will be the recognition of peace which from a domestic standpoint will end all war powers and will repeal the war statutes. But the question of settling the rights between Germany and the United States will still remain. It will be much easier to fix these rights by building the new association of nations on the remnant of the league left after the objectionable features are eliminated, than to attempt an entirely new organization. The treaty itself provides that amendments to the league shall not in any way interfere with the obligation of Germany to the treaty as a whole.

When the league and treaty have been purged of their objectionable features in accord with the Republican reservations, and with Mr. Harding's policy, as declared in his campaign speeches, it is hard to see what objection there can be to settling the terms of peace by ratifying the treaty with all these changes.

Mr. Harding, with his enormous majority, coming into power after eight years of Democracy, will naturally have great prestige and strong leadership in his party. He will hear all views and with tact and kindly consideration assist his followers to aid him in the fullest performance of the promises of the Republican platform and his own. The majority of the Republicans in the new Senate may be eighteen. This will prevent a few dissents from blocking party policy in domestic matters.

EUROPE PLEAS AT U. S. ELECTION

Paris Press Urges Appointment of Myron T. Herrick as Ambassador

London, Nov. 4.—Senator Harding's declaration that he is only an ordinary man who wishes to be honest with everybody in the world, has won the heart of Great Britain's press, public and officials, judging from comment heard throughout the city today and from press editorials.

The Harding administration may begin with Europe's confidence in his fair and honest and with Europe believing his advent in office will put an end to the two years of procrastination in American as well as European affairs. In fact, there is a very decided opinion here that Harding comes to the helm at a time when the world ship of state is threatened on all sides by revolutionary and financial crises, and in this crisis, as in 1917, Europe expects America's moral leadership to again turn the tide from disorganization to progress in reconstruction.

'WOMEN DEFEATED ME,' BERGER SAYS

Asserts Suffrage "at First Always Helps Reaction," but Will Prove Boomerang

SOCIALISTS MAKE BIG GAINS Chicago, Nov. 4.—Socialist party national headquarters here tonight claimed 2,000,000 votes for Eugene V. Debs in the country, nearly four times what the party got in 1916 and more than twice its record vote in the Debs campaign of 1912.

The party also claimed the election of eight assemblies and one state senator in New York city, which polled 131,859 Socialist votes Tuesday, 100,900 more than in 1916. Indeed, this year Debs received more than a third as many votes as Cox in the world's biggest city.

Philadelphia gave Debs 17,834, nearly half the entire Socialist vote cast in Pennsylvania last year ago, and the vote for Debs, with 765 ballots, was 31 ahead of Cox. The town of Yucca, N. D., gave Debs 47 votes, Harding 47 and Cox none.

He asserted that woman suffrage "at first always helps reaction" because the well-to-do women will always vote while the working class women do not vote as a mass.

He said that woman suffrage eventually would be one of the greatest weapons of democracy in existence.

Boston, Nov. 4.—The Socialists appear to be celebrating returns that have troubled their vote of four years ago in Massachusetts and the Socialist-Labor party to have doubled theirs. In 1916 the party received 11,058 and 1096. Returns from 337 precincts out of a total of 1209 in Tuesday's election give Debs 951.

The vote for Cox and Gillman, the Socialist-Labor candidates for President and Vice President so far as tabulated shows an average of approximately two votes for each of the two candidates.

The lead of Harding and Coolidge over Cox and Roosevelt remained tonight at 401,811.

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 4.—The women have chased socialism out of Milwaukee. Fifty-five thousand of them went to the polls Tuesday and gave the vote to the party the worst whipping it has received since it became a factor in city politics. Berger himself was defeated in the race for Congress in the Fifth district, and he lays his defeat to the women.

Taking advantage of their franchise rights, the women were not slow in registering their disapproval of the Socialists.
