

### ARREST SUSPECTS IN MAIL-BOX THEFT

Checks Stolen at Ninth and Market Recovered in Room of Man Held

### TRAIL PAIR TO RESTAURANT

Checks stolen from the mail box of Price & Keller, at the northwest corner of Ninth and Market streets, were found by detectives in the room of John Howard, alias Gleason, who was arrested early this morning in a restaurant near Twelfth and Race streets.

In the arrest of Howard, who is now in the hands of the federal authorities, the police believe they have taken the first step toward running down the gang of mail-box thieves who have been operating in the central part of town lately.

Yesterday morning fourteen private mail boxes near Ninth and Market streets were robbed. Detectives Ryan and Flavey were assigned to the case, and during their investigation saw Howard standing near Ninth and Market streets.

Early this morning they saw the police believe they have taken the first step toward running down the gang of mail-box thieves who have been operating in the central part of town lately.

Howard at first said his name was John Gleason. A notebook found on him gave the numerals "237-12," and on a change the detectives visited the house at 227 North Twelfth street. They learned he had rented a room there yesterday. They searched the room and found a bag containing four checks to an aggregate sum of about \$400, which had been stolen from Price and Keller. There were other checks in the bag, also sets of ink eradiator and a jimmy, which fitted marks on the mailbox.

The prisoner, when confronted with the evidence obtained by the detectives, admitted his real name was Howard, and that in 1909 he had shot and killed a gangster in New York named Byrnes, for which he was convicted of second degree murder and sentenced to prison. The police say he also was in prison in Baltimore for larceny. Howard and Christensen denied they

know each other, and the police so far have been unable to "get anything" on the second prisoner. Both men were turned over to the federal authorities. The police believe a well-organized gang has been operating in the center of town, following the mallman and stealing letters with checks or cash in them almost as soon as they are placed in the mail boxes.
