

MAY END MINERS' WAGE DEADLOCK

Secretary Wilson Calls Anthracite Men and Operators to Capital for Conference

WARD MAY BE REOPENED

Washington, Nov. 24.—Representatives of the anthracite mine workers and operators were called by Secretary Wilson today to meet here next Wednesday in an effort to break the deadlock in the pending wage negotiations.

The call was announced at the Labor department after Secretary Wilson had conferred with representatives of the mine workers who came here from the Pennsylvania hard coal region to learn the attitude of the government regarding the reopening of the award of the anthracite coal commission.


