Wilson Recommendations on Armenia Go to League

Washington, Dec. 8.—(By A. P.) President Wilson has completed his recommendations with regard to the boundaries of Armenia and has forwarded them to the League of Nations in session at Geneva. It was said today at the State Department. The recommendations were not made public. They were formulated at the request of the principal allied powers and it was explained that they had no direct bearing on the prospective efforts of the President at mediation in Armenia.

PEACE COMMISSION EXPENSE \$1,651,191, WILSON REVEALS

President Sends Special Message to Senate on Cost of Mission

HOUSE COMMITTEE PLANS FOR REVISION OF TARIFF

Washington, Dec. 8.—A special message giving the complete expenses of the American peace commission during its work abroad was transmitted to the Senate today by President Wilson. Total expenditures amounted to \$1,651,191.00 from December 1, 1918, to December 4, 1920. The amount actually paid out was \$1,701,742.00, but repayments and gains in exchange reduced this to \$2,529,570.

CROATIANS TO PROCLAIM INDEPENDENT REPUBLIC

VIENNA, Dec. 8.—(By A. P.)—Leag smoldering discontent among Croats against Serbian rule has resulted in a declaration by the newly elected assemblymen of the radical party that they will proclaim the independent Croatian peasant republic tomorrow. It is said in dispatches from Agram, the Yugoslav government is thoroughly in touch with Croatian developments, according to Belgrade advices, and the cabinet council is considering means to maintain order.

PLAN TRIUMPHAL ENTRY FOR CONSTANTINE

BRINDISI, Italy, Dec. 8.—Several members of the Greek Chamber of Deputies, politicians and other prominent persons have arrived here from Greece to join Constantine on his return to Athens. They say Constantine's entry will be the most triumphant since the days of ancient Greece.

Washington, Dec. 8.—President-elect Harding left on Washington the impression that he was going to be his own man in the White House, and that his cabinet was going to be a Harding cabinet and not a Senate cabinet. It was not anything he said that caused this impression. It was rather his capacity for keeping his own counsel and the failure of any adviser here to rush him into any decision.

Endues Clutches of Senate

The Senate, but is the Republican majority in the Senate, the effect of Harding, and it does not seem to have produced any final impression upon the party. He has not taken it for the whole of his life. He has been able to whole him off his feet. He has passed the first test.

Harding's "Big Four"

These are all primarily Harding men. Daugherty has been politically associated with Harding since the days of his election to the Senate. He is usually responsible for Harding's making a move for the presidency. There is no one else in the Harding cabinet who is known to be so close to Harding as Daugherty. Daugherty can probably do more to assist Harding in his administration than any other one man in the cabinet.

LISTENS MUCH, SAYS LITTLE

Sutherland's connection with Harding is more secure. He went to Marion to advise and to see the situation there that he remained until election day. He also is an ex-senator.
