## Former Mrs. Leeds to Accompany New Ambassador to America in January

# BRITISH NOT TO BE HASTY

Athens, Dec. 23.—Dr. Scyllianos, head of the political bureau of the foreign office, said yesterday he had been nominated minister to the United States. He stated that he would go to America early in January and possibly would be accompanied by the Princess Anastasia, who, before her marriage to Prince Christopher of Greece, was Mrs. William B. Leeds, of New York.

Dr. Scyllianos, who is forty years old, several times was imprisoned by the Venizelists for his opposition to the Greeks, as there might be explanations of their recent action.

The question of the revision of the treaty was raised by Walter F. Guinness, who advocates re-establishing relations with a reasonable Anglo-

government and territorial concessions, provided the followers of Mustafa Kemal Pasha yielded to the Allies' control on essential points. Major General Townsend, former commander of the British troops in Mesopotamia, who recently was elected to the Commons, offered personally to undertake a mission to Mustafa Kemal.

Mr. Lloyd George, in the course of a long reply, argued it was impossible to go behind the Constantinople Government. That government, however, already had approached Mustafa Kemal, who was en route to Constantinople, and if they arrive at an agreement the Allies would be able to discuss matters with governments representing the whole of Turkey.

# WOULD DEPORT AGITATORS

Australians Incensed at Japanese Responsible for Clash  
Perth, Australia, Dec. 23.—Leaders of the whites, organized under a police inspector, are patrolling the streets of the peeling town of Broom. They demand that the Japanese responsible for Wednesday's affray be deported.

While order was maintained last night it is reported that certain of the Japanese are still in ugly mood, and have been joined by hostile Malays. The Broom police inspector fears more bloodshed may occur at any hour.

# LE OSTILITA' TRA FIUME E L'ITALIA

## D'Annunzio ha Proclamato lo Stato di Guerra Contro il Governo d'Italia

Londra, 23 dicembre.—D'Annunzio ha proclamato che uno stato di guerra esiste tra il suo governo di Fiume e l'Italia ed ha proibita alla popolazione di Fiume di lasciare la città, secondo un dispaccio giunto da Roma alla Exchange Telegraph che dice la notizia proviene da fonte ufficiale.

Il corrispondente da Roma della Central News aggiunge che il proclama di cui sopra reca che chiunque parli

contro "D'Annunzio" è passibile della fucilazione.

Roma, 23 dicembre.—Tutte le apparenze di uno stato di guerra sono state stabilite lungo i confini di Fiume. Ostacoli sono stati posti lungo le strade e le linee ferroviarie, nonché reticolati, e le linee telefoniche e telegrafiche con Fiume sono state tagliate. Pattuglie ciclistiche recano ordini di per i diversi quartieri generali, e tutti i punti strategici sono guardati dalla cavalleria.

Lungo la frontiera della Regione del Quarnero le autorità militari hanno disposto per rapidi mezzi di trasporto da un punto all'altro. Il Generale Cavaglia, comandante in capo delle truppe di blocco ha pubblicato un manifesto nel quale esorta i suoi uomini a dare prova di disciplina e lealtà. Dal canto suo D'Annunzio ha esaltato l'opera dei marinai della torpediniera recentemente passata a lui e ha invitato i soldati e marinai italiani di seguirne l'esempio. Ha detto, inoltre, che l'ammuntamento è giustificato per la santità della guerra che egli combatte.

Trieste, 23 dicembre.—Forti cordoni di carabinieri e di alpini sono stati di Fiume di lasciare la città, secondo un dispaccio giunto da Roma alla Exchange Telegraph che dice la notizia proviene da fonte ufficiale.

La flotta italiana che si trova nella base di Pola esercita la sorveglianza di fronte al Golfo del Quarnero, giorno e notte, ed usa forti riflettori per impe-

dire qualsiasi movimento delle navi al servizio di D'Annunzio.

Il Generale Cavaglia disse di tempo a D'Annunzio fino alle ore 11 pom. di martedì per decidersi ad accettare il trattato di Rapallo, ma il poeta lasciò spirare detto termine e quindi ripose che il patto non poteva essere accettato e che era pronto alla resistenza. Dopo ciò il Cavaglia ordinò il più rigoroso blocco e diresse un appello ai cittadini stranieri ed ai borghesi che si trovano in Fiume di abbandonare la città entro 48 ore.

Bologna, 23 dicembre.—Un grave conflitto è avvenuto mercoledì a Ferrara, città che trovava a 27 miglia a nord di Bologna, ove i socialisti organizzarono una dimostrazione di protesta per i recenti attacchi contro i deputati socialisti di Bologna. Quattro persone rimasero uccise e più di trenta ferite, prima che la polizia e le

truppe potessero intervenire per ristabilire l'ordine. Quindici così dette guardie rosse, che facevano parte di un numero gruppo che nel pressi del castello medioevale facevano fuoco sopra i nazionalisti, furono arrestate e molte altre riuscirono a fuggire.

# CAPITOL HOLLY-GARBED

Trees and Wreaths Decorate Building—Sproul to Give Candy  
Harrisburg, Dec. 23.—The state Capitol has begun to prepare for Christmas. Trees and wreaths, strings of holly and red ribbons have commenced to appear in departments. The State Department won the honors for the first Christmas tree again.
