

# SUPPOSED VICTIM PROTECTS BANDIT

## Man Who Yielded Money Vanishes During Pursuit of Alleged Robber

### SUSPECT MAKES ESCAPE

Two automobile patrolmen are mystified at the action of a man they saw yield to a robber, who disappeared while the robber was pursuing his accomplice, early this morning.

A Negro, riding on a motorcycle, stopped at the corner of Broad and Cherry streets at 2:30 o'clock. He had his lights out, left his motor running, and stood beside his machine as if waiting to meet some one.

When a motorcar came along Broad street going north, he drew a revolver, and the driver to stop his car and hand over his money.

At this moment Motorcycle Patrolmen Feldman and Flynn happened along, and saw they actually saw the man in the motorcar hand money to the man they thought was committing a hold-up.

They got their machine more "gassed" and started in pursuit of the man, who fled by this time seen then and was on his machine and off up Broad street. They didn't stop to question the man in the motorcar, thinking he would naturally follow or report to the nearest station house.

After a chase of twenty blocks the riding machine commenced rapidly to fade away from the patrolmen and finally was lost sight of.

The two officers then returned to find that the man who was thought to have been held up had disappeared.

# AMBLER ON TRIAL MONDAY

Former Insurance Commissioner to Face North Penn Charge

Charles A. Ambler, former State Insurance Commissioner, has been ordered to appear for trial next Monday for his alleged connection with the failure of the North Penn Bank.

The case is of extraordinary interest here and throughout Pennsylvania because of the prominence of the defendant who was speaker of the House before he became State Insurance Commissioner. The trial is scheduled to take place in Quarter Sessions Court, Room 653, City Hall, Judge Henry, of Lebanon, will preside.

Ambler was to have been tried last January 31, but Judge Stern granted a postponement upon the request of Michael J. Ryan, Ambler's counsel. The request was based on the illness of Daniel F. Lefean, former State Banking Commissioner, who was expected to be one of the strongest witnesses for the defense. Lefean, who also is under indictment, was a patient at the Lankenau Hospital.

# WOMAN ASKS \$50,000

Alleges Disfigurement of Face by One-Time Friend

Mrs. Agnes Hilton, of Tuckerton, brought suit in the New Jersey Supreme Court to recover \$50,000 damages from Mrs. Susan B. Rider, of 104 South Connecticut avenue, Atlantic City, alleging that she had been permanently disfigured and incapacitated for work.

The two women had been friends for years.

Mrs. Hilton took a ride with Mrs. Rider in her automobile in October. On their return they found the Rider house closed and detected the odor of gas in the room of a boarder. It was night.

Mrs. Hilton was asked to assist in an investigation and as she followed Mrs. Rider, who carried a lighted lamp, there was an explosion and Mrs. Hilton was injured.




