KRAUSKOPF LAUDS BOK IN ADDRESS

Former Editor Is Cited as Example for Successful Americans

SPEAKS AT LENGTH ON BOOK

Tribute to Edward Bok, former editor of the Ladies' Home Journal, for his initiative and perseverance was paid by the Rev. Dr. Joseph Krauskopf, at Temple Keneseth Israel yesterday morning in an address of exceptional interest.

His address was entitled "The Self-Retirement of Mr. Bok." In the course of his remarks Dr. Krauskopf sketched the career of Mr. Bok from boyhood until his retirement from the editorship of the magazine.

Dr. Krauskopf spoke at length on the book, "The Americanization of Mr. Bok," and said every young American should read it. Mr. and Mrs. Bok attended the service.

Dr. Krauskopf commented upon the ability and energy of the man who gave that magazine 2,000,000 subscribers and put more than \$4,000,000 in advertising in the October, 1919, number, which was the last to be published under his editorial supervision.

SODA TAX REPEAL URGED BY LEDERER

Internal Revenue Collector Here Says It Costs More Than It's Worth

DISPUTES TOO EXPENSIVE

Repeal of the tax on soda water and ice cream was urged yesterday by Ephraim Lederer, collector of internal revenue for the eastern district of Pennsylvania, who declared that the government is being cheated out of a large part of the revenue to which it is entitled.

Disputes over the amount of the tax and lengthy investigations when returns are suspected as false have cost the Revenue Department so much

money that the levy has not proved profitable, he said. Failure of confectioners and storekeepers to keep record of their sales has been one of the causes for confusion in the collection of the tax, according to Mr. Lederer.

"The storekeeper takes an antagonistic attitude toward the collector when asked to produce his bills for materials purchased from wholesale firms," Mr. Lederer said. "If these bills can be found, the collector then proceeds to make a record of sales and taxes for the storekeeper if he has failed to make a record himself. Computing of the taxes from bills takes considerable time and is a great expense."

When asked if he advocated the repeal of the luxury tax, such as those levied on theatres and other amusements, Mr. Lederer declared he did not, saying they were a great source of revenue for the government.

More than \$700,000 is realized from the theatre tax in this district alone, which means that many millions are collected throughout the country.

Speaking on the income tax question, he issued a warning to all delinquents to pay the tax and not to try to withhold it from the government. Those persons who have filed returns and not paid even as much as their first in-

statement and do not intend to pay eventually they will be caught and be may get away with it for a while, but in hot water, he said.
