Fine Links Schedule Delivered to Members—Titular Finals at 36 Holes—New Holes Staked

The Bala Golf Club has just gotten out its schedule for the coming season, the feature of which is five cup tournaments. All possible dates not taken care of by these tilts are filled by a variety of novel events, so that the earnest linksmen of this thriving golf center are not going to pine away from lack of competition.

The first tourney is for the Horace Trumbauer Cup, seventy-two holes of medal play virtually covering the month of May. This is followed by the W. H. Wilson tourney, a six-hole rehearsal for the club championship in July, the finals of which are at thirty-six holes. It's no mean triumph to win the title either. The President's Cup, donated by Frank McAdams, is the absorbing event in August, and the Alvin M. Ebert Cup tourney takes care of the better part of September and October.

A two-day tourney, kickers, tomstone, Scotch foursome and various medal play events, are the main novelties provided.

The grand and glorious annual Bala Invitation has not been listed. When work on the eighteen-hole course, which will include the present nine lay-out, starts Bala will be in the situation of trying to entertain during house cleaning.

As pointed out, the new clubhouse will be at the rabbit club, with a terraced outlook over at least three holes. The added property will furnish some holes and a complete round that will be a treat even to such sincere, expert and veteran golfers as they have out there at Bala. The new holes are all staked out ready for business.

KRAMER HANGS FIRST K. O. ON JACK WOLFE

Danny Finishes Cleveland Bantam With Left to Jaw in Fifth

Cleveland, April 22.—For the first time in his ring career, Jack Wolfe was counted out last night in Cleveland, his opponent being Danny Kramer, of Philadelphia.

A vicious left to the jaw in the fifth round brought curtains to the popular bantam. Up to the time the finishing blow was administered, Wolfe was ahead on points as the Cleveland boy sneaked a new hard right-hand punch that rocked Kramer more than once.

The first round was even and the second went to Wolfe, who got in some hard blows to the stomach and face. In the third and fourth, Wolfe improved his tactics, although Kramer was not idle, several hard punches from a wicked left finding their mark.

In the eventful fifth, Wolfe tried hard, but in a flash Kramer's left came up like a whirlwind and landed hard on Wolfe's jaw and it was dreamland for Jack.

Kramer lived up to his reputation of being one of the hardest hitters in the bantamweight division.

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MISS LEITCH 83 IN FIRST

Burhill, England, April 22.—Miss Janet Jackson, the Irish woman golf champion, today won the women's golf tournament for the cup offered by Golf Illustrated. She turned in a score of 158 for the thirty-six holes of medal play. Miss Alexa Stirling, the American champion, made the thirty-six holes in 161.

Miss Jackson, who made the morning round in 80, completed the afternoon round in 78. Miss Stirling turned in a card of 40-21-81 in the morning round, and 39-41-89 in the afternoon.

Miss Stirling, who is American, Southern and Canadian champion, carried a huge gallery through the day and finished fourth for the first eighteen-hole round with a total of 81 strokes.

Miss Cecil Leitch, British champion, trailed that count by two strokes, being eighty-three for the morning round. She drove well but approached badly.

Miss S. Marshall, Miss F. E. Helme and Miss Jackson all had scores of 80 for the first round.

Miss Stirling drew continuous applause for her shots this morning, which were straight, long and true. The red-haired Yankee girl, proving to be quite the sensation around London courses this week and in every tourney.

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ment she has carried tremendous galleries, as her chances of beating the British players in the coming championship are now conceded to be most dangerous.

Hogey for the course is 70 where today's tournament was played. Miss Stirling began the contest by driving beautifully, the stroke being long and straight. On the second, 365 yards, she holed a five-yard putt, and was down in 4, or one under bogey for the hole, while on the third she holed a two-yard putt. Her score for the first three was 5-4-4.

Miss Stirling's score of the fourth, fifth and sixth holes was 4, 5 and 8. She was off the fairway for the first time on the fifth, where she pulled into the rough, but she got out handily and was down with a bogey 5. On the short sixth, Miss Stirling was on the far side of the green on her shot from the tee, but she laid her approach by the side of the hole, and was down again in bogey 3.
