

TRANSIT BILL VETO URGED OF GOVERNOR Philadelphia Senators Lay Down on Job, United Business Men Assent ALL SAFEGUARDS OMITTED

Declaring that all safeguards for the protection of the people are disregarded and that corporations will have supreme power to build trolley lines anywhere they please through the passage of House Bill No. 600, the United Business Men sent a protest to Governor Sproul today urging him not to sign the bill.

The communication was sent by action for the organization. This action was decided upon as a last effort to keep public utility concerns from controlling the streets of the city. Although numerous members of the Senate had promised to support their own bill, several preventing the passage of the bill, it is contended by the association they were indifferent and lay down on the job.

Safeguards Omitted The protest to the Governor says, among other things: "All the safeguards for the public protection which were provided in the matter of street railways, are omitted from this bill. The original act of 1880 provided that in applications for change of routes and highways and for routes to be added to the existing lines should be set out and the amount of the capital stock per mile set forth.

Bill Repeals Provisions "The bill in question repeals all the above provisions of the original act. The present bill does not provide for any of these safeguards, but on the contrary devotes all the streets of every city in the Commonwealth to overhead trolley wires if only local consent can be obtained.


