

**ARMY PREPARES

Carpentier Will Be Guest of Honor of Men Who Fought in War

ENTRY LIST IS LARGE

Wednesday the three branches of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps will meet for the first time in competition on the athletic field. They have had chances to compare themselves in the grim game of war and come off all winners, but the Legion Field Day, which will be held Saturday on Frankford avenue, will determine to whom the athletic laurels belong.

Final details for the big meet are being completed rapidly. Entries from military and naval stations throughout the country will be sent here to compete and also several teams from our Allies will try decisions with their American war comrades. Canada will send a team in the meet and looms as a strong contender. The University of Pennsylvania has entered its varsity football team.

Colonel Franklin D. Oiler and Major Anthony J. Drexel Biddle have been named by the county committee to welcome George Caspenter as guest of honor at the meet.

Bookman-Buchbaum Post, No. 95, will hold its monthly meeting Thursday at the Southwark branch of the Y. M. C. A. at Fifth and Ellsworth streets. The post will give its first outing of the season Sunday at Neshaminy Falls.

"Navy Night" will be given by the William F. Roche Post, No. 21, June 24, at which three navy men will tell how "the navy look" can be sent here through "an hatch." All former service men are invited to the affair.

DEACONESSES GRADUATED

Women Workers Honored by Episcopal and Presbyterian Churches

Deaconesses of the Protestant Episcopal and the Presbyterian Churches were honored at special exercises conducted by both denominations yesterday.

Bishop Rhinelander presided at the commencement exercises of the Church Training and Deaconess House of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, in the Pro-Cathedral, Broad and South streets. The Rev. Dr. J. De Wolf Perry delivered the address.

Diplomas were awarded to seven young women, five of whom are ready to engage in deaconess work. They are Miss Gladys Spencer, who goes to Japan; Miss Susan B. Smith, who goes to Alaska; Miss Florence Huban, who will become an assistant in the Deaconess House; Miss Beulah Dobbins, who goes to the Diocese of North Carolina; and Miss Letta Tafton, who will continue in training in the Episcopal Hospital.

Two special students, Miss Esther L. Loughan and Miss Amelia H. Hill, will work in China.

Luncheon was served in the Guild House of the Pro-Cathedral, and there was a reception at the Deaconess House, 179 Spruce street.

In connection with the commencement exercises of the Philadelphia School of Christian Workers, three deaconesses were set apart by prayer at an adjourned meeting of the Presbytery of Philadelphia yesterday afternoon in the First Presbyterian Church, Germantown. The Rev. Dr. Matthew J. Hyndman and several other clergymen offered prayers for the success of the young women in their new work.

CHINESE COMMITTEE ENDS

Famine Relief Body Raised \$106,000 in Six Months

The Philadelphia Chinese Famine Fund Committee, of which George Horace Lotimer is chairman; Alba B. Johnson, treasurer; and Miss M. Carey Thomas, Mrs. George Wharton Pepper, Mrs. William Joseph and Joseph Leidy are members, with J. Jarden Guenther as executive secretary, today finishes the six months' term of service for which it was appointed by President Wilson and will end its work as an organization.

During the life of the Philadelphia organization something more than \$106,000 was collected with the cooperation of the special Chinese Famine Fund Committee of the Emergency Aid, of which Mrs. Joseph Leidy is chairman, and the Chinese students of the University, and sent to the relief of the famine sufferers.

That takes an account of very large contributions, amounting to many thousands of dollars, stimulated by the work of this committee, which were sent direct to the national headquarters and to church missionaries. The national organization is planning to continue its work until the 1st of August, as there is still much want and distress in the Province of Chihli, where the first crop was a failure.

NEW 'L' TO LIFT LAND VALUE

Properties Along Frankford Line Being Held for Increase

Valuation of the P. R. T. land came up again yesterday before Commissioner Clement in the City Hall. The session was devoted to the cross-examination of Frank Massey, one of the realty experts employed by the city.

Referring to a tract at Frankford avenue and Arrott street, held by the company as a site for a car barn or power house, the witness valued it at \$60,200, which is \$39,800 less than the valuation placed upon it by P. R. T. experts.

"I did," responded the witness. "Are you aware of the fact that a piece of land purchased three years ago for \$35000 is now being held by the owners at \$11,000?"

"The owners of properties in Frankford are holding on to their realty," said Mr. Massey, "in the belief that they will be greatly increased in value when the Frankford L line is placed in operation. They are asking all kinds of prices."

Mr. Joyce remarked at the conclusion of the hearing that if the valuation of the parcel of land in question was based on sales recently made in the immediate vicinity it would bring the value up to \$250,000 instead of \$100,000.

It is expected that the cross-examination of John J. Crout, the remaining city expert, will be completed today. On Friday the company will produce engineers, who will place a valuation upon the various power houses and other engineering properties belonging to the corporation.
