

PENNA. IS HONORING BIRTHDAY OF FLAG

Patriotic Exercises Take Place at Betsy Ross House and Elsewhere

BIG PARADE TONIGHT

Thousands of school children here at noon sang patriotic songs and saluted the flag in honor of Old Glory's birthday.

War veterans, war mothers, Boy Scouts and fraternal organizations joined in paying tribute to the colors. Philadelphia, the birthplace of the flag, led the Nation in celebrating the event.

The parade will form at Broad and Spring Garden streets at 7:30 o'clock, and will move south on Broad street to Market, to Fifth street, to Arch street to the Betsy Ross House.

For the first time, women will take part in the flag day celebration of the P. O. S. of A.

Following a bugle call by the Firemen's Band, there will be an invocation by the Rev. Asher Hens, followed by the "Call to the Colors."

The children, headed by their teachers, left the various institutions where they belong and went directly to the Zoological Garden.

DELAWARE BRIDGE PLANNED AS BEST

Engineer Board Chairman Says Phila.-Camden Span to Be Greatest in World

FRANKLIN SQ. SITE FAVORED

The Philadelphia-Camden Bridge will be the best bridge in the world, both from an artistic and engineering standpoint, according to Ralph Modjeski, He is chairman of the Board of Engineers which made the report concerning the proposed Delaware River Bridge and made this assertion yesterday after the public hearing in City Hall.

The hearing was called to discuss the Franklin Square-Penn street site for the bridge and several bids for the conflicting views. A majority of those present, including Mayor Moore, endorsed the site named and expressed the belief that it was the real possible one.

Designers Limited in United States When asked how the proposed bridge would compare with others, Mr. Modjeski made the prediction stated and in discussing the subject generally added: "There are different conditions to be met in the United States from those in other countries."

To Use Advanced Ideas "We hope in the Delaware River Bridge to express the furthest advance in American bridge design," said he, as well as to include the most advanced engineering work.
