

LAUNCH NEW PLAN TO BUY HOG ISLAND

Philadelphia Business Men Would Develop It as Another Bush Terminal TO CONSULT WASHINGTON

Plans to acquire Hog Island and develop it into a mammoth shipping terminal are being considered by a number of Philadelphia business men headed by Ellis A. Gimbel.

Realizing that definite and speedy action must be taken to improve the port and attract more foreign trade here, the men interested in the Hog Island project believe its development is one of the most important steps in this direction.

Following an informal discussion of the plans for acquiring the yard, at a dinner in the Philadelphia Country Club last night, Mr. Gimbel said today:

"A number of business men and engineers of this city are agreed that the best plan at Hog Island should be acquired for the benefit of the city and State."

Men who attended the dinner pointed out that the yard offered opportunity to place Philadelphia in the front rank of the country's ports and should not be allowed to remain idle. It was emphasized that the yard would afford an ideal site for terminal warehouses for the Government, State and city.

Plans are in tentative stages and the men interested would like to develop the yard along the line of the Bush Terminal.

Plans are in a few days to go to Washington where the subject will be taken up with the Government.

"All the men present were in favor of the plan and they are confident that definite steps toward acquiring the yard and doing so with the least possible delay. A hearty spirit of co-operation was manifested and it is believed the plan will bear fruit. It is the belief of many of those interested that the Government will subsidize the plan and thus give the project an impetus."

They have the aid of Congressman Edmonds and other legislators who realize that development of the port is one of the most serious problems confronting the city. The Pennsylvania Railroad and other corporations will lend a hand to make the yard a success.

STRESSES NEED OF NURSES

White-Williams Foundation Backs Request of Furbush

Director Furbush's request for additional school nurses, made recently to the Board of Public Education, was endorsed today in a statement by the White-Williams Foundation for the Study and Assistance of Children of School Age.

The Foundation states that "in a small primary school where we have been working, the doctor found that forty-two children out of the fifty-one examined in the kindergarten and first grade had one or more physical defects. There was no nurse in the school and our trained worker had not had a nurse's education, but she had to do the best that she could in clearing away the physical defects before she could hope to secure social adjustment."

The Foundation states that last year the medical inspectors found 180,029 defects in examining children, of which 98,992 were not treated, and points out that this failure to provide treatment probably was in many instances due to the fact that there was no nurse to explain to the parents the consequences of neglecting their children's defects.

ASKS TAX REDUCTION

Camden County Board Inspects Gloucester Plant

The Camden County Board of Taxation today inspected the plant of the Ancona Printing Co., in Gloucester, because the company has asked for a reduction of \$20,000 in its tax assessments for this year. The shipyard of Pusey & Jones, on which a reduction of \$305,000 is asked, was also inspected by the board.

SCORNS NEW SUNBURN CURE

Philadelphia Doctor Smiles at Violet Ray "Hocus-Pocus"

A nice cool collar or the shade of a tree, if you remain under the tree long enough, will "cure" sunburn quicker than the "synthetic-sunshine" treatment reported from a dermatologist, says Dr. Charles Davis, a dermatologist, of 1031 Spruce street.

Some New York physicians are treating severe sunburn by subjecting its victims to ultra violet rays. The artificial sunshine is said to heal injured tissue.

"Hocus-pocus" was Dr. Davis' comment. "Instinct is better than reason in a case of that sort. Even the animals seek the shade. The sunburn will cure itself."

JUDGE WARNS PATROLMEN TO APPEAR AS WITNESSES

Bench Warrants Will Be Issued if They Fail, Barratt Says

Judge Barratt today warned all patrolmen called as witnesses before him that the next one who fails to answer when his name is called will be brought in on a bench warrant and either fined or committed to jail.

"I'm getting tired of having cases declared by failure of patrolmen to answer," said the Judge. "They are remiss in their duty, especially when they have been subpoenaed to appear here. They represent the Commonwealth. It is the duty of the District Attorney to issue an attachment for them."

Judge Barratt's statement was occasioned by the absence of Patrolman McCarty, who was a witness in the case of Mollie Bishop, sentenced to a year in the House of Correction as a drug user. The young woman was brought into court today on a writ of habeas corpus because after six months she had been pronounced cured of the drug habit.

U. N. J. UTILITY BOARD APPEALS

Court's Right to Increase Trolley Fares is Denied

Trenton, July 8.—The State Public Utility Commission, in announcing today that it would take an appeal to the Court of Errors and Appeals from the opinion of the Supreme Court, in which the latter body remanded back to the board the board's refusal to grant the Public Service Railway emergency increase in fare of from seven to ten cents, said:

"The board considers the order of the Supreme Court unwarranted by law, in that it orders the board to fix a rate higher than seven cents upon the evidence heretofore submitted. The board contends that the court's power is prescribed by the Certiorari Act and by Chapter 150 of the laws of 1918. The latter restricts the court's power as to the board's acts, to set aside any order not based upon the evidence, but does not prohibit the consideration of additional evidence.

Ran Down and Seriously Injured Pedestrian at 13th and Huntingdon


The police are looking for the chauffeur who ran down Edward Terry, of 2602 North Twelfth street, at Thirtieth and Huntingdon streets last evening.
