

TIE SCORES FEATURE TWILIGHT CONTESTS

Smith-Furbush and Logan Square Battle to a 3-3 Deadlock and Belfield and Donovan-Armstrong Quit in Tenth, 5-5

TONIGHT'S CONTESTS

The feature games of last night's twilight layout were a pair of tie battles in which Smith-Furbush and Logan Square quit at the end of seven sessions at 3-3 down at Twenty-third and Shunk streets, and a game up in Germantown between Donovan-Armstrong and Belfield, which was called at the end of the tenth at 5-5.

Revenge is sweet but when one carries that revenge to an absolute rout the revenge is much the sweeter. That is the verdict of Cleveland fans this morning. It isn't so bad, they contend, to be defeated in what looks like a real game, but to be absolutely vanquished, well that is another thing, they say as they smile the smile of content.

All that Tris Speaker and his clan did yesterday was to wallop the overrating daylights out of Mays and some other stars of Huggins' twirling staff for seventeen runs in a game. Cleveland had the grand parade on the pennant leader. The Yankees, it will be noticed, are down twenty runs on Tuesday and many, many days previous to that day.

While the game out in Cleveland is noteworthy from the standpoint of the American League city at large, we are more concerned with the doings of the Athletics and the Phils. First of all the Athletics. Talk about tough luck. Sixteen hits to nine in fourteen innings and yet the verdict went against the Mackmen.

Lost 8 by 1 Run Margin Since the Athletics left home they have lost eight games by one run margin, five of the eight being extra-innings, 2 to 1 in sixteen, 2 to 1 in fourteen and two 3 to 2 games in ten innings. In all since leaving the loam at Twenty-first and Lehigh avenue, the A's have been trounced just seventeen times.

Yesterday's reverse was really a tragedy. In the very first inning Witt, Dukes and Welch singled in succession. With no one out the stage was set for at least one run, but nary a counter into a two-run inning. Clarence Walker came across, as Clarence Walker hit and the other Walker was an infield out. Chances came to the Athletics on more than one occasion after that, but they were unequal except in the sixth, when a single by Witt and a double by Clarence Walker counted the only run of the long contest for the Mackmen.

Urban Faber, star spital hurler of the Sox, achieved his twentieth victory of the season when he beat the Mackmen. The big right-hander has participated in twenty-eight games and has been charged with but six defeats. Manager Gleason, commenting on Faber's work, declared that he was the greatest pitcher in any league. Faber pitched a total of 223 innings and has been touched for 155 hits by his opponents.
