Links Etiquette Barred in Favor of Rollicking Raspberry. Boat to Be Launched

LOW SCORE AT PLYMOUTH

Talk about the nerve fiber necessary to win the national open golf championship—it has nothing whatsoever on the qualities which will be called into play to win the "loon" golf tournament at North Hills this afternoon.

All of the royal and ancient rules will be observed, but the royal and ancient raspberry will be delivered on each and every occasion where it seems apropos and some pieces where it isn't.

In other words, all rules of etiquette will be barred. The only thing the trailers can't do is interfere with a player's stance or swing.

You can't throw your hat at his ball, but you can insult him at the top of his swing, and if he puts, walk behind him and do all of those things which are frowned upon at a regular tournament.

The Rules
The rules and regulations tell all about the event. Have a look:
"The event shall be played in squads of either ten or fifteen men—each squad to have a captain appointed by the committee, who shall keep track of each hole. The squad tee off on the first tee and the entire squad plays the hole together. The player who scores best is eliminated on the first hole, and the man having the poorest score on the second hole is eliminated, etc., until there is one man left, who will be the winner of the squad. In case two or more are tied with the poorest score on a hole, they simply play on until one is eliminated."

"All rules of golf must be strictly observed, but it is requested that none of the known ethics of golf be observed in any manner; in other words, it will be quite all right for you to give the player about to make a shot a real raspberry at any time your conscience dictates. The only thing you must not do is to interfere with the player's stance or swing."

"When the squad winners are determined they shall immediately return to No. 1 tee, and the winners of the different squads then play off the event in the same manner as outlined above."

"After a player is eliminated he simply joins the imagination to develop ways and means of destroying the mental equilibrium of those who are still in the game."

A feature of this tournament will be the launching of the S. S. Hesperus at the water hole. The S. S. stands for "see you." It is a boat that has been better days, but nobody can prove it. The victim of today's hilarity has been painted a bright yellow for the launching ceremony.

FIRST TITLE BIKE RACE 35 MILES ON THURSDAY

Champion Chapman, Carman, Wiley and Lawrence Entered
Final arrangements were completed last night for the running of the first of a series of motor-paced events to decide the 1921 champion of America.

Four of the leading riders eligible to compete for the United States crown will start in the first of the series, the Velodrome on Thursday night in a thirty-five-mile race. Later an hour's grid and a fifty-mile race will be decided in choosing the Philadelphia title holder. For the first time in history of the motor-paced sport a point system will be used in deciding upon a champion.

George Chapman, Philadelphia's crack hiker, and who won the 1920 title at Boston last year, is entered in Thursday night's event here. The other three starters will be Clarence Carman, of Jamaica, N. Y.; Percy Lawrence, of California, and George Wiley, of Syracuse, N. Y.

Besides the championship race on Thursday night, there will be a series of thousand-dollar alternate sprint races between four stars from as many different countries. They are Orlando Piani, of Italy; Walter Hurt, of Germany; Bill Bailey, of England; and Alfred Goulet, of America. Four heats will be run in this event with three riders, and points will be awarded in deciding the winner.

Several amateur events also are on the card.

BRADLEY SOCKS GIBBONS Pat Administers Terrific Lacing to Grays Ferry Rival

The other four bouts resulted in knockouts. Joe Carlo, a brother of Bradley's, stored away Joe Rick in the second round. Tommy Wilson knocked out Cy Morris in the first. Wally Austin put Johnny Moore to sleep in the fifth, and Ray Mulligan hung the quietus on Sammy Williams in the first.

TRIAL OF BASEBALL PLAYERS IS HALTED

Stenographers' Report Raises So Many Questions Court Is Temporarily Adjourned

TO REVISE CONFESSIONS

Chicago, July 26.—When Walter J. Smith, court stenographer who took down Eddie Cleotis' Grand Jury confession, began reading the confession in the baseball trial today, so many questions were raised by the defense that it was necessary to adjourn court temporarily while the attorneys went into conference with Judge Hugo Friend.

Since a confession is presented only against the man making it, Smith was not allowed to mention any name except Cleotis'. The defense maintained that such words as "bull players," "outfielders" and "infielders" also were barred.

Judge Friend ordered the attorneys to reach an agreement on the wording of the confessions before presenting them in court, but after two hours of argument only two pages of Cleotis' thirty-page statement had been revised.

Indications were that it would take all day to revise the three confessions. Smith was on the stand yesterday, but court adjourned before he had read Cleotis' confession. The stenographers who took down the confessions of Joe Jackson and Claude Williams, former White Sox players, were expected to follow Smith on the stand.

Alfred Austin, attorney for the Chicago American League Club, will strengthen the State's case by telling of the confessions Cleotis, Jackson and Williams made to him before going to the Grand Jury room. Harry Bringham, foreman of the Grand Jury before whom the confessions were made, will be called to verify the court reporters' stenographic stories.

The confessions are expected to consume the entire day and if the State decides to call William Maharg and Joe Gleason, their two remaining witnesses, they probably will not take the stand before tomorrow. The State, however, may decide its case is complete without their testimony.

Meanwhile, preparations are going forward for the proposed investigation by a Grand Jury of the recent baseball scandal, the alleged \$10,000 bribe given for the originals of the testimony presented to the first Grand Jury, while State attorneys also have announced a wide investigation of the 1919 scandal and other possible indictments if convictions are secured in the present cases.


