BODIES OF 24 MORE HEROES DEAD ARRIVE

Twenty-three were Philadelphians, while other was Camden Man

Another troop train rolled into the Reading Terminal this morning and twenty-four soldiers were unloaded in wooden boxes, embraced by the colors they died to keep clean.

The same weary, melancholy scene that has hallowed the feelings of Philadelphia's citizens was re-enacted as the bodies of the hero dead were lifted from the baggage cars, loaded onto trucks, and wheeled away to the undertakers' wagons waiting below.

These are the gifts of an anonymous giver—a glove whose name remains a secret despite earnest efforts to ascertain it. The beauty of the thought that prompts this action was accentuated this morning.

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The Associated Fraternal Societies appeared today for the second time in this capacity. Buses by the gradually thinning crowds that came to the station to meet the bodies of the returning heroes, this organization, which did such splendid work during the war, came to Philadelphia on the train.

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GAS LEASE CHANGES URGED BY EXPERTS

Engineering Firm Would Have New Temporary Rate Pending Survey

REPORT GOES TO MAYOR

A radical revision of the lease between the city and the United Gas Improvement Company for the operation of the city-owned gas works was recommended today by Ford, Bacon & Davis, engineers, of 1421 Chestnut street.

The engineering concern was asked to make a report on the present gas situation by the Commonwealth Title Insurance and Trust Company, which holds 8,000 shares of U. G. I. stock in its trust department.

The engineers' report has been sent to Mayor Moore by Charles K. Zug, vice president of the trust company, and also will be referred to Richard Wiegelin, president of Council, and Samuel J. Bodine, president of the U. G. I. Co.

The existing lease, the engineers reported, "is apparently silent as to a number of essential protective provisions, both from the standpoint of the city and the company, and any new arrangements now to be entered into should contain equitable provisions sufficient to obviate a recurrence of the present situation."

The engineers recommend the suspension of the present rate of \$1 for 1000 cubic feet. As a preliminary the firm suggests an investigation to fix a new temporary rate.

With such a rate in force, a complete investigation should then be made, the report says, including a calculation of all tangible and intangible assets of the gas works. This should not consume more than six months, it is declared.

"We would also suggest," the report says, "should the faller investigation develop a rate less than the temporary rate, that this rate be retroactive and the difference between it and the temporary rate refunded to the gas consumers, or, if found to be impracticable, then to the city."

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OLD DICK, MANAYUNK HORSE, PERISHES IN STABLE FIRE

Found With Nose Pressed Against Closed Door

When the smoke cleared away from the ruins of the plant of the Glen Wagon Ice Company on Cinnaminson lane near the Reading Railway, which was burned early this morning, the body of "Old Dick" was found. His nose was pressed against the front double door and one foreleg also rested on it.

He died undoubtedly after a frantic attempt to save his life. Although the nearest house is half a block distant, residents say they heard the sniffling of the horse about the time of the fire. But the fates seemed to conspire against Dick. A freight train passed during the fire and prevented those who sought to save the imprisoned animal from reaching the place. Dick's cry for help was lost in the grind of the rumbling wheels.

Dick's body was discovered by Mike Costello, the stable keeper. Mike handed Dick to a veterinarian, who told the latter's early youth and, to tell the truth, Mike was brokenhearted.

Dick traversed the streets of Manayunk for years. After he had been hauled to an ice wagon it was only necessary to say "giddap." Dick then followed his route without any further orders.

The fire is believed to have been caused by sparks from a cigar which an uninvited guest had smoked in the ice house. The flames caused about \$3000 damage.
