HURTS FAIL TO KEEP BRIDE FROM ALTAR

Refuses to Delay Wedding Despite Burns Received When Liquid Explodes

FACE IS BADLY BURNED

An explosion which spotted her face and neck with flaming acid, narrowly missing her eyes, did not prevent the wedding this morning of Miss Ida Klubukowska, a comely Polish girl, to Adam Judycki, a Manayunk patrolman, in St. Joseph's Catholic Church.

Some months ago a neighbor who is a chemist, going from Philadelphia to an up-State town, left with the bride's family a medicine chest. Yesterday, in putting the house to rights in preparation for the wedding, the young woman found a long glass vial in the chest, filled with a pale yellow liquid.

The noise of the explosion brought her younger brother, Theodore, and her fiance from the house. She shrieked and fainted as the burning liquid seared her arms as she fell, and Judycki threw water in her face, washing away the liquid before the burns were deep enough to leave permanent scars.
