

ANTI-CONVENTION MAJORITY 99,698

Returns From All of 67 Counties Are Tabulated at State Capitol

TOTALS 518,889 TO 419,191

Harrisburg, Oct. 11.—The people of Pennsylvania voted down the proposition for a constitutional convention by a majority of 99,698 at the special election held on September 20, according to the official computation of the votes of the various counties made today at the State Bureau of Elections.

Computation of the vote on the convention question and for the special election for a Congressman at-large to fill the Garland vacancy was held up by the delay in the Lackawanna returns, which were received today by Chief George D. Thorn.

The vote on the convention of the sixty-seven counties is announced as: For, 419,191; against, 518,889.

In 1901 the vote on the same question was: For, 172,813; against, 420,598.

The Lackawanna vote was: For, 10,678; against, 11,484.

The vote of the State for Congressman-at-large is announced as: Thomas E. Crago, Republican, 705,570; John P. Brecken, Democrat, 221,288; Cora Bialer, Socialist, 20,781; B. E. P. Prugh, 74,837. Crago's majority over Brecken, 484,282, over a 279,019.

The certificate of Colonel Crago's election was immediately issued and sent to Washington.

Complete figures on the Democratic vote for the Supreme Court nominations were obtained today by telephone from missing counties and show Judge Eugene C. Bennett, Philadelphia, to have been the nominee. He received 4817 votes under correct spelling of his name and 1535 under incorrect spelling; while Justice William I. Schaffer received 2822; H. S. Dumbauld, Lancaster, 2293; Charles Palmer, Delaware, 852.

SYMPATHY SHOWN SHORE COUNTESS

Mrs. Drischman's Lawyers Hope to Swing Public's Favor From Mrs. Griswold's Daughter

WILL CASE OFF FOR DAY

Atlantic City, Oct. 11.—Opposing forces in the bitter legal battle for the possession of the half-million-dollar estate of the late Alice Gerry Griswold, former Baltimore society belle, sought to strengthen their lines today while Judge Robert H. Ingersoll went to Mays Landing to be present at the formal opening of the fall term of Court.

Not in court has a court proceeding attracted much attention in Atlantic City. Never, it can be safely said, has a will contest evoked such popular interest or aroused such an acute state of public feeling.

There are about the case many factors which contribute to this result. The curiosity of the average American is intrigued by the personalities of the two women who are fighting each other for the dead woman's money.

On the one hand is the Countess Griswold, only child, a pale, determined-looking middle-aged woman of aristocratic mien.

Spectators in the courtroom comment about her and they agree that she looks the part of a Countess. She fits the picture which the case has drawn of her. One need not be told that she is descended from a family in which social pride with dignity and all it means have been factors for many generations.

One is not surprised to find that she is descended from the great Napoleon's brother, Jerome Bonaparte. Spectators admire sympathetically when they are told that the Countess was out of with \$500 in her mother's will.

On the other hand is Mrs. Mary B. Drischman, wife of an Atlantic City butcher. Mrs. Drischman, plump and estate looking, does not at first glance impress one as the "real estate wizard" she has been called. But when she

talks one is made to realize that she is a person of force and shrewdness, possessed of the native ability to "get things done." And the spectators, especially the women in the courtroom, sneer openly when she tells the Court that she alone was kind to Mrs. Griswold after the former social favorite had been deserted by all her aristocratic friends.

As Mrs. Drischman testifies, the eyes of the Countess remain fixed on the witness with a cold stare at the woman she accuses of having virtually imprisoned her mother as part of a conspiracy to rob her of her wealth and the Countess of her inheritance.

Attorneys for the Countess expressed confidence today in the showing they have made toward breaking the will. They point to the fifty affectionate letters from Mrs. Griswold to the Countess as proof that no estrangement existed between mother and daughter.

They have presented the testimony of one physician who swore that he "didn't want to put his name to a paper saying Mrs. Griswold was sane."

On the testimony of numerous witnesses they have established the fact that Mrs. Griswold was a habitual user of drugs.

They have drawn from Mrs. Drischman the admission that the minister who witnessed the signature of the dis-


