GIANTS FAVORITES IN BETTING, 7 TO 5

Odds Shift When McGraw's Champions Tie Up Series With Yanks

13 TO 10 ON TODAY'S GAME

New York, Oct. 12.—In the betting parts of the city the Giants are conceded to have all the edge. The professionals appear to be agreed that the National Leaguers have a robust margin, and, as a result, McGraw's men have been installed the favorites to win the series at odds of 7 to 5.

Betting on the outcome of today's game was chiefly at 13 to 10, with the Giants the favorites. The odds took this decided change not simply because the Giants won the sixth game and covered up the tie, but chiefly because of the inability of Babe Ruth to play and the fact that the majority were of the opinion that the Giants had a decided edge in pitching.

Many were of the opinion that the morale of the Yankees had been seriously affected by Ruth's absence from the game. As one commissioner expressed it: "The Yankee pitchers haven't the same confidence with Ruth out of the game that they have when he is playing. This means a great deal, and I believe the Giants will win chiefly because of this."

With the series even at this stage, naturally each team has just as many chances of winning. There are just four ways in which the series can be won. The Giants can clinch it by winning the next two, the Yankees one and the Giants the last, or the Yankees two and the Giants the next and the Yankees the final.

Thus it might at first appear that the betting would undoubtedly be at even money if the Yankees were able to put their full strength in the field, but with Ruth out and the Giants possessing what appears a fair edge in pitching the speculators do not fancy the chances of the Yankees as much as they do those of the Giants.

"We're Leading Them a Dog's Life," Is "Jawn's" Comment on Series

New York, Oct. 12.—"We're leading them a dog's life," is the comment today after the Giants had evened up the World Series.

"Just when they think they have us on the run," he added, "we turn around and upset all their calculations. We won yesterday because we deserved to win. We hit the ball hard and hit it when the blow did the most good. The Giants were on their toes, and when they are playing at their normal speed it takes a mighty good ball club to stop them."

"As a result of yesterday's game I think we have the edge. I think I can summon more capable pitching than can Huggins. His players are all game and they are good, hard workers, but the Giants are just as game and just as hard workers. The pitching gives us the edge. I will not predict that we will win the next two games, but I would not be at all surprised if we did. One thing is certain: we are going to try our best to win them."

"Jes Barnes pitched another fine game after he relieved Fred Toney in the first inning. You noticed that he struck out every Yankee player at least once during the game. That's quite a performance. It proves just how much stuff he had and how perfect his control was. I have seldom seen a pitcher work the corners the way he did today, and he was seldom in the hole. Generally he had the batter in the hole by

getting the first one over for a strike. "I am not sure, but I think little Johnny Rawlings made a World Series record when he made all three putouts in the ninth inning. Not only has he pitched a great game, but he has pitched a great game at any moment. His hitting has been very opportunistic. Kelly has hit his stride, and he is the kind of hitter that is likely to break up a ball game at any moment. His fielding, too, has been excellent. More than once he has saved one or another of the infielders from making wild throws by his fine catches."

"I have said from the outset that we will win the series, and I still say so. I say it now more emphatically than at any previous time. I am convinced that the Yankees cannot stop us, because I know that we have the better ball club."

Receipts for Six Games Are More Than \$650,000

New York, Oct. 12.—Receipts for the sixth World Series game amounted to \$112,234, and official attendance was given at 34,283. The total attendance for the series is 208,063, while the receipts for the six games amount to \$655,807.

Every member of the winning team in the series will receive approximately \$250,42, while the "losers" share will be \$350,28. The players share in only the first five games.
