

U. S. INVITATIONS OVERWHELM FOCH

Would Like to Accept Them All, but Fears Effect on Digestion

STACK FOOT HIGH RECEIVED

Paris, Oct. 13.—Marshal Foch would like to accept all the invitations he has received from the United States since he was announced that he would cross the Atlantic this fall.

Friends who call upon the Marshal are shown a stack of invitations more than a foot thick which he has received. There are hundreds of them, including greetings from Governors of various States, Mayors of many cities, public bodies of every sort and private messages from prominent residents of the United States.

"Which of them will you accept?" an American visitor asked the Marshal recently.

"All of them," he replied. "I would like to visit every State in the Union."

It has been impossible for the Marshal's itinerary, which thus far includes a trip across the continent to San Francisco.

The Marshal's only apprehension as to the desirability of the American people is the possible effect it may have upon his digestion. Remembering the condition in which Marshal Foch returned from his visit to America, Marshal Foch frequently mutters: "Poor Foch!"

The generalissimo of the allied armies is still amazed over Marshal Foch's pleasure when the chairman of the Entertainment Committee in Boston showed him upon his arrival late one evening the program for the day following. It began in the early morning with a sight-seeing tour, followed by a reception of delegates, a midday banquet and speeches and an afternoon reception. A public dinner and reception were scheduled for the evening, and this was to be followed by a ball.

"What do you think of it?" the chairman is reported to have asked the Marshal.

"It lacks something," replied the Marshal. "I see nothing regarding my funeral arrangements at the end of the day."

It might be remarked that Marshal Foch is abstemious in his daily life, his habits being almost ascetic in character. Colonel Francis G. Drake, deputy commander of the Paris Post American Legion, will accompany Marshal Foch to America at the latter's request.

BRITISH MAKE PROTEST

Treatment of Immigrants Under New Law Is Issue Raised

London, Oct. 13.—The British Government has made formal protest to Washington about the treatment of British immigrants at Ellis Island under the new Immigration Law. It has not protested at the limitation of nationality, fully recognizing that it is none of its business, but it has protested at the treatment accorded some of the immigrants under the present Ellis Island administration.

For instance, one case mentioned is that of a young couple, of good social position, who, with their baby, were herded four days in a pen with filthy immigrants and refused even a hearing by the officials. The State Department has not yet answered the note, but when the answer comes it probably will be published, with the original complaint, in the form of a report to Parliament.

TRYING BULGAR WAR CHIEFS

Judges Are All Simple Peasants. Elected by the People

Sofia, Oct. 13.—(By A. P.)—The trial of Bulgarians accused of war crimes opened yesterday in a Courtroom which has been specially fitted up for the occasion. The courtroom was crowded to capacity. The accused men include ten former Cabinet Ministers and three Generals. They are charged with high treason in favor of Germany and misappropriation of public funds. The public prosecutor is demanding the death penalty for most of the defendants.

Statesmen and diplomats to the number of 100 have been subpoenaed as witnesses. The judges, who were elected by the people, are all simple peasants. They sit on the bench dressed in their picturesque national costumes.

Havre Honors Columbus

Havre, Oct. 13.—Brilliant and impressive ceremonies attended the celebration by this seaport town of the discovery of America, Havre considering itself a stopping stone to the new world. One feature of the celebration was the unveiling of a statue of Francis I, founder of Havre. A bronze tablet was affixed to what is now the customs office, formerly the private house where General Lafayette stayed before leaving for the United States to take part in the Revolutionary War.

GERMAN MINISTRY SHAKEN BY SILESIA

Wirth Cabinet May Be Displaced by Reactionaries Opposed to Reparations

LEAGUE DECISION UNKNOWN

Berlin, Oct. 13.—Resignation of the German Cabinet was believed today to be impending, if press reports of the decision of the Council of the League of Nations relating to the appointment of Upper Silesia were confirmed by the official text of the decision, expected later this afternoon.

There has been little effort on the part of Government officials to conceal the fact that the Cabinet would face a crisis if German towns should be separated from the empire by the action of the League Council. Disorders are feared in Government circles.

Paris, Oct. 13.—(By A. P.)—Recommendations of the League of Nations Council for a settlement of the Upper Silesia question were received by Premier Briand this morning. They will be communicated during the day to the allied Governments, and as a matter of courtesy, to the United States, probably through the American Embassy here.

The terms of the recommendations will not be made public until an exchange of views as to further procedure. All the alleged details thus far published are declared to be pure conjectures.

It is known, however, that the League proposal implies the necessity of dispositions to prevent an economic upthrust in the industrial region of Upper Silesia. Hence, it is deduced with

strong reason that the proposal is a compromise between the French and British views and divides the industrial triangle of Silesia between Germany and Poland.

Special Dispatch to Evening Public Ledger

New York, Oct. 13.—If the League of Nations Council decides against Germany in the Silesian boundary question, an cable dispatch late today reads (foreshadowed an adverse decision, the Wirth Cabinet will resign and the German Government fall into the hands of the reactionary group opposed to the fulfillment of the reparations agreement, Isaac Marcossou, a journalist, declared yesterday.

Mr. Marcossou, who recently returned from a four months' interviewing tour of Europe, said the Wirth Government is really desirous of paying the billions of marks demanded in reparations by the Allies, but has opposed it a very powerful group of interests and individuals.

"The present Government in Germany has already concluded the payment of one billion gold marks. Walter Rathenau, German Minister of Reconstruction, recently reached an agreement with Louis Loucheur, French Minister of Liberated Regions, for the payment in actual houses, machinery, wagons and other material of an additional seven billions of gold marks."

"This agreement was important not only materially to France, but because it was the first sign of a spirit of getting together. If the Wirth Government falls, this agreement will probably be repudiated and the reactionary administration power will say to the Allies: 'We've done our best, now you've got to come and take it.'"

"Another effect of this decision against Germany will be a further rupture between England and France, for England has steadfastly supported Germany in her contention that the plebiscite, in which 90 per cent of the inhabitants voted for Germany, should stand. France has supported Poland, which lost in the plebiscite."
