

TO INVOLVE FAMILY IN STILLMAN CASE

Banker's Wife Seeks to Drag in Husband's Brothers and Sisters

TO SECURE GUY'S RIGHTS

New York, Oct. 18.—All the dependants of James Stillman, father of the banker, are made potential principals in the son's divorce suit by virtue of an order signed last night by Supreme Court Justice Seeger, in Newburgh.

This order, the result of the latest action of Mrs. Stillman's forces, places in the role of those who may desire to question Guy Stillman's legitimacy and interest in a \$37,000,000 estate the banker's two sisters, Mrs. Perry and Mrs. William G. Rockefeller, and his brothers, Charles, Chauncey and Dr. Ernest G. Stillman.

The order is a precautionary measure taken to insure against future quibbling upon Guy's parentage if the present action results in his favor. Specifically, it gives the trustees, executors and beneficiaries of the will an opportunity to join forces with the banker in the attempt to prevent Guy's participation in the various trust funds established by the late Mr. Stillman.

The order will be argued before Supreme Court Justice Morschauer, in White Plains, Friday. It counsel for Mrs. Stillman was the scheduled controversy, the banker's brothers and sisters become "parties to the issue," and if they so desire, appear at the hearing and present evidence.

Mrs. Perry Rockefeller has already figured in the suit, having testified for her brother at the hearings in Toughkeepsie.

Both sisters and brothers, from available information, side with the banker, much as they dislike the publicity attached thereto.

W. & M. TO BESTOW DEGREE ON HARDING

President Will Deliver Address at Installation of Famous College's New Head

HISTORIC SCENES AROUND

By the Associated Press. Williamsburg, Va., Oct. 18.—Preparations have been completed for the arrival here tomorrow of President Harding to attend the installation of Dr. J. A. C. Chandler as president of the College of William and Mary, and to receive an honorary degree.

Before coming here the President will speak in Yorktown at the monument erected in 1881 on the spot where Lord Cornwallis surrendered to the Continental Army 100 years before. He will also visit Jamestown, seven miles away, the site of the first English colony in America.

Governor Westmoreland Davis will preside at the college exercises, which will be attended by representatives of universities and colleges in the United States which are more than 100 years old. William and Mary itself was founded in 1693, and is the second oldest college in the country. It became a university in 1779, the first such institution in America. The old "President's House," where Mr. Harding will alternate the headquarters of Lafayette and Cornwallis during the Revolution.

William and Mary has given three Presidents in the United States—Jefferson, Monroe and Tyler—Chief Justice Marshall and three Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, four signers of the Declaration of Independence, twenty-nine United States Senators, twenty-two Governors, three Speakers of the House of Representatives, ten cabinet officers and many Representatives. Other distinguished graduates have included Dexter Randolph, first President of the Continental Congress, two Ambassadors to France, and Gen.

eral Scott and several other distinguished army officers. The first honorary degree, that of master of arts, was conferred by the college upon Benjamin Franklin in 1755.

CAPITAL COLD TO LEDOUX

Leader of Unemployed Says Washington Has No Civic Conscience. Washington, Oct. 18.—(By A. P.)—"A city without a civic conscience," was the appellation bestowed upon the national capital today by Urban Ledoux, self-elected shepherd for a group of unemployed. The population of Washington, he declared, is composed principally of "leaders who care to take rather than to give."

Having failed to find a collective conscience here, Ledoux said he would continue his efforts to locate some other city.

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
