HAYS ASSUMES CHARGE OF N. Y. MAIL THEFT PROBE Driver of Truck Gives Police Valuable Information

New York, Oct. 27.—(By A. P.)—Postmaster General Hays arrived here today to take personal charge of the investigation of last Monday's registered mail robbery by automobile bandits, who held up a mail truck and escaped with five pouches filled with bonds, securities and currency.

Frank Havranek, driver of the looted truck, was called from his home for another questioning by Postoffice inspectors today. Havranek has been under almost constant examination since the robbery occurred, and yesterday added important details to his story of the hold-up.

Inspector also let it be known that Havranek had given them a white canvas laundry bag which he said had been stolen over his head and tied before the bandits rifled his truck. The owner's name had been torn from the bag, but the letter at the end of the name—an "E"—remained, and the bag is regarded as a valuable clue.
