**POLICE SEEK FRIEND OF TAYLOR'S VALET**



**Statement of Servant Sends Detectives Working on Case on New Trail**  
**TILT WITH WOMAN BARED**

Los Angeles, Calif., Feb. 21.—Investigations detailed on the case of William Desmond Taylor, film director, shot down in his home here three weeks ago, were working today along lines brought out as a result of an amplified statement taken yesterday from Henry Peavey, Taylor's houseman.

They were trying to locate another Negro said to have roomed with Taylor in St. Louis at one time, and later to have known him here. They also were checking through Eastern sources to determine whether Taylor carried any bank accounts in New York or other large Eastern cities. The investigators were silent about any progress they were making, but said nothing of importance had been developed in the last few days.

A woman who claims to know of a bitter quarrel between another woman and Taylor, a few days before he was slain, was summoned to the District Attorney's office yesterday to tell her story, which was expected to furnish new clues in the investigation of the mysterious crime.

Precautions were taken to keep secret the identity of the woman witness, as she informed Chief Deputy District Attorney W. C. Doran she would not appear unless she was assured she would be shielded from publicity and that her name would not appear in connection with the investigation.

The woman told Doran that she knew both Taylor and the other woman, with whom she said Taylor quarreled several days before he was slain. The quarrel, according to the woman, occurred at Taylor's home and worried the director considerably.

Deny Peavey Confession  
It was said that if the woman's story warranted the move the woman who quarreled with Taylor would be located and questioned by District Attorney Woolwine.

Additional information is expected from a Pittsburgh pawnbroker who reported Saturday that a man giving his name and address as "George F. Smith, 404 B. South Alvarado street, Los Angeles," left jewelry at his shop recently.

**HIGH COST OF KISSES CHARGED TO TAYLOR**

Valued at \$100,000 in Girl's Suit Against Penrose's Former Aide  
**SAME RATE FOR HUGS**

Washington, Feb. 21.—Hugs and kisses at \$100,000 each, the value placed upon them by Miss Alma C. Smythe in her suit against Leta Stetter Penrose, former secretary to the late Senator Penrose, set a new standard—even for senatorial circles.

Miss Smythe's charges interested official and unofficial Washington. So did her suit. But the question that is asked here today is not "Are they true?" but "Why did she pick on Taylor?"

Her petition recites contacts with numerous high and low officials—Senators, Congressmen, secretaries to Cabinet members, one or two Cabinet members themselves, a lieutenant governor and others.

Yet in bringing suit she picked out Taylor, who, she alleges, barred her way to Senator Penrose, when she sought to see the Senator about a claim she was pressing against the Republican National Committee.

Taylor refused today to make any statement about the suit, or the incidents leading up to it. He retained John Thomas Taylor, of Philadelphia, member of the National Legislative Committee of the American Legion, as his lawyer. Mr. Taylor said he was looking into the facts and might have a statement later in the day.

Meanwhile friends of Secretary Taylor, who has been employed by the Penrose estate since the death of the Pennsylvania Senator, are saying the suit and charges are alike preposterous.

Miss Smythe's Story  
Miss Smythe's own story appears today in greater detail than she gave it in the petition filed yesterday in the District of Columbia Supreme Court.

It seems she came here from Pennsylvania early last spring. She told those on whom she called that she sought to collect a sum approximating \$25,000 from the Republican national organization. According to her story, she had made arrangements to deliver speeches and do propaganda work for the Republican National Committee in the presidential campaign. To do this, she had resigned a lucrative position in South America—or with a South American firm. The speeches were prepared. She put in a lot of time in preparation for her political activities. For some reason she was never used by the National Committee and her services were dispensed with—still according to her own story—on short notice.

Says Taylor Forced Attention  
At that point, she says, Taylor, as Penrose's secretary, blocked her plans and forced his attentions on her.
