BOYS OF '61 MARCH IN THINKING LINES

G. A. R. Posts Pay Solemn Tribute to Comrades Who Have Answered "Recall"

JOIN WITH YOUNGER MEN

Veterans of the Civil War, in spite of advancing years and thinning numbers, paid tribute today to the memory of their comrades, just as they have done on the Memorial Days of more than half a century.

In most instances the posts combined with posts of the Sons of Veterans, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion.

The majority of the Memorial-Day services were held this afternoon, though there will be some in the evening.

Fifty-three Answer Call Winfield Scott Post, No. 114, G. A. R., honored their dead and the veterans of other wars in Mount Vernon Cemetery.

There were Memorial Day exercises, presided by a parade and followed by a march to a cemetery, this afternoon at City Hall Plaza.

In preparation for the Plaza exercises, Reynolds Camp No. 4, Sons of Veterans, decorated the monuments of General J. F. Reynolds and George B. McClellan. Following the ceremonies on the Plaza, the veterans visited the graves of their comrades.

Graves Are Decorated This morning the post decorated the graves of its dead in North, Central and South Laurel Hill Cemeteries.

This afternoon the post marched to North Cedar Hill Cemetery for memorial services. The veterans were accompanied by the following organizations:



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
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AT FORT WASHINGTON Children Give Pageant and Franklin D'Oiler Speaks
